





Col. BARDWELL, explained that his motion had no reference to past issues, but was, by its very wording, confined 'to the present time, and to issues now being frade.

Dr. OTIS FARMANKS, of Loon, wished to bury the past, to harmonize and have peace on earth, and to east no reflections on any one. Our busfiless is to establish a party that will form a republican government; and let it not be said that it is a reproach to belong to that party.— Let us do nothing that will give our enemies a handle to bring charges against us. There are fields enough before us without bringing up the past, and I would respectfully ask the gentleman to withdraw his motion:

Rev. Mr. PIRECT, of Leon, does not profess to be so timid. I am not really aware of what evils may exist, but I am for facing the music just as it is: "I tim villing to bury the past, as well as the last speaker, and I have quite as much to bury. If there is any wrong to be exposed and remedied let us go to work and remedy it. We flettin to do what is perfectly right, but not to court anybodys favor, or to save anybodys feelings.

MATHEW P. LYON, of Hernando, agreed with his friend Dr. Fairbanks as to the propriety of burying the past, but he was also in favor of burying Confederate debts. Last year \$2 200 at least, of the money collected, for taxes was paid for this purpose, and this thing should be stopped.

I have no knowledge, nor have I any reason to believe, that the order has been desregarded at any time. The case of a freedmen named Alfred referred to. This occurred while General Joster was in command of Houdo; upon my relieving him, the jurisdiction of Sureau Courts were considered of a doubtful character, and were avoided, when practicable. The circl law was deemed sufficient to meet the case. The Hon Thomas Long, Judge of the Soura --mnee District Court, assured the Officer, comm-- anding at Sake bity, near where the entrage was committed, that Thomas should be brought before his court, for trial. Upon this report, made by the commander of the Post, Thomas was placed under bonds of fire hundred dollars to appear before the next term of the bant. He did appear, but there was some informality in the indictment. A. Nole proceque was entered, when Judge Long ordered him to be rearrested, and the man is now under fire hundred dollar bonds



I am unable to answer it, Sam only say, that in all cases regarding the question of wages, Justice is done the freedman, whether by Impell, or the officers under my command. The fronth case occurring in the month of June 1865: Mayor General Foster was in, command of Horida. I met Mr. Josefer in my office in January 1866, when he referred to his suit regarding cotton in the interior . Hewas in his way to Sallahassee to see General Foster, what transpired between General Joston Mr Joseph I am unable to say, but my impression is, that the matter was adjusted, or dismassed by some civil process, owing to the running away, or to the murder of an important witness. Mr. Joseph left the Stale about one year ugo. In relation to the general remarks indulged in, detracting from my official conduct, and character, my only defence is in the good order

which has prevailed in Mouida during twenty months part - the execution of the laws - the industry and contentment of the freedmen- the peace and security of communities - the protection of life and property - the growing fidelity to he Union - the protection of legal citizons - and the present successful progress of registration . A want of efficiency, indefference to the public good, as alleged, could not have secured, the present prosperity and quiet which the State of Florida now enjoys. The fact and trath is, that I have not parmetted schemes and measures calculated to excite citizens, and provoke discord and disatisfaction. I have geven protection and encouragement to all mon, without reference to their being from the South or the Morth. I have seen no cause to denounce and discourage those citizens who are disfranchised, and who are struggling to obtain their daily bread, and who are aiding the government by their advice in rectoring the State to the Union. If layal itigens have not been protected, Senonal Popes Mead Quarters has been for four months accessable, and he to,

at all hours, papers of every description have been sent to me daily from that source, but not one word of complaint from whites, or colored citizens have reached me upon any subject. The Sayal League, and Kinion bud, have been in session here from time to time for a year, looking, after the interests of the idejons, but not a complaint, or a remonstrance, has come to me of any Kind . They have made it the duty of their associations to protect the rights of lagal men. I am surrounded by disloyal pentiments and by promoters of discord. One of the signers of this paper, W.J.J. Duncan of Parker Florida, has been arceted by my order, and placed under thirty five hundred dollar bonds, to appear at the next term of the Sattahaeree Circuit Court, to answer for cruely whipping his freedmen; Sir of them appear against him. Appeal to the Mayor General Commonding as to whether such false, and malignant accusations, while in the discharge of my duties under the Milday. Bill, do not approach sedition and disloyalty, and whether these parties ought not to be arrested and brought

before a military commission for falsefying the agents of the General Government while entrusted with the important duties of registration reconstruction. S Washington De General I learn that a committee of the Republican State Convention held in Tallahasse on the 11th ulto, appointed to inquire of outrages upon Union men to instead of doing that, on the very day of their appointment or the day after, wrote a letter to General Pope and one to you without submitting them to the Convention where they might and I think mild have been rejected, containing their inpressions of some cases that they had heard of, and taking occasion to complain of bolonel John Seprague bang, Dest. of Florida and your Aset, bow here. I know nothing of. the cases mentioned by that committee, but I do know of cases in which bolonel Spraque has done ample justice at least enough to counterballance those. I also know that it is unfair to make a sweeping condemnation of a Commander on account of a few cases when there are very many cases In which if suggives into it will be found that he has exhibited patriotic efficiency and done ample justice. I also know that bolonel Sprague hours patriotism is

determined to protect the loyal of both races, and you no more to rebel sympathisas than is required by the magnanimous forbearance and liberatity which ou victorious Country ever displays. His position is a dificult one, and would be so for any Commander, it is impossible to please all even of friends but his general course has been mise and patriotic and has had the effect to prevent outbreaks and combined law lessness of any kind to that Honor has been and is under his command most quit and peaceful of any.
