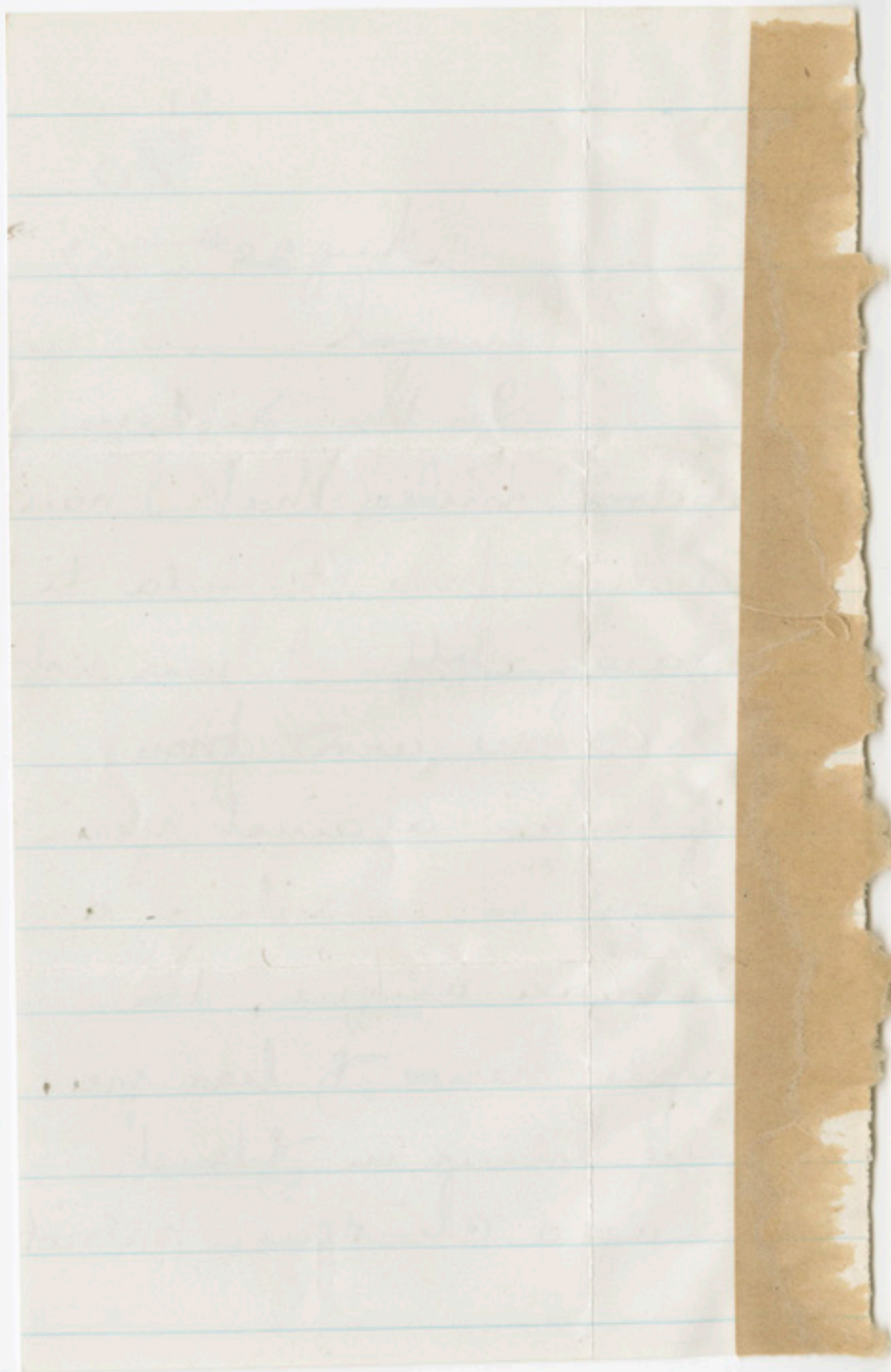

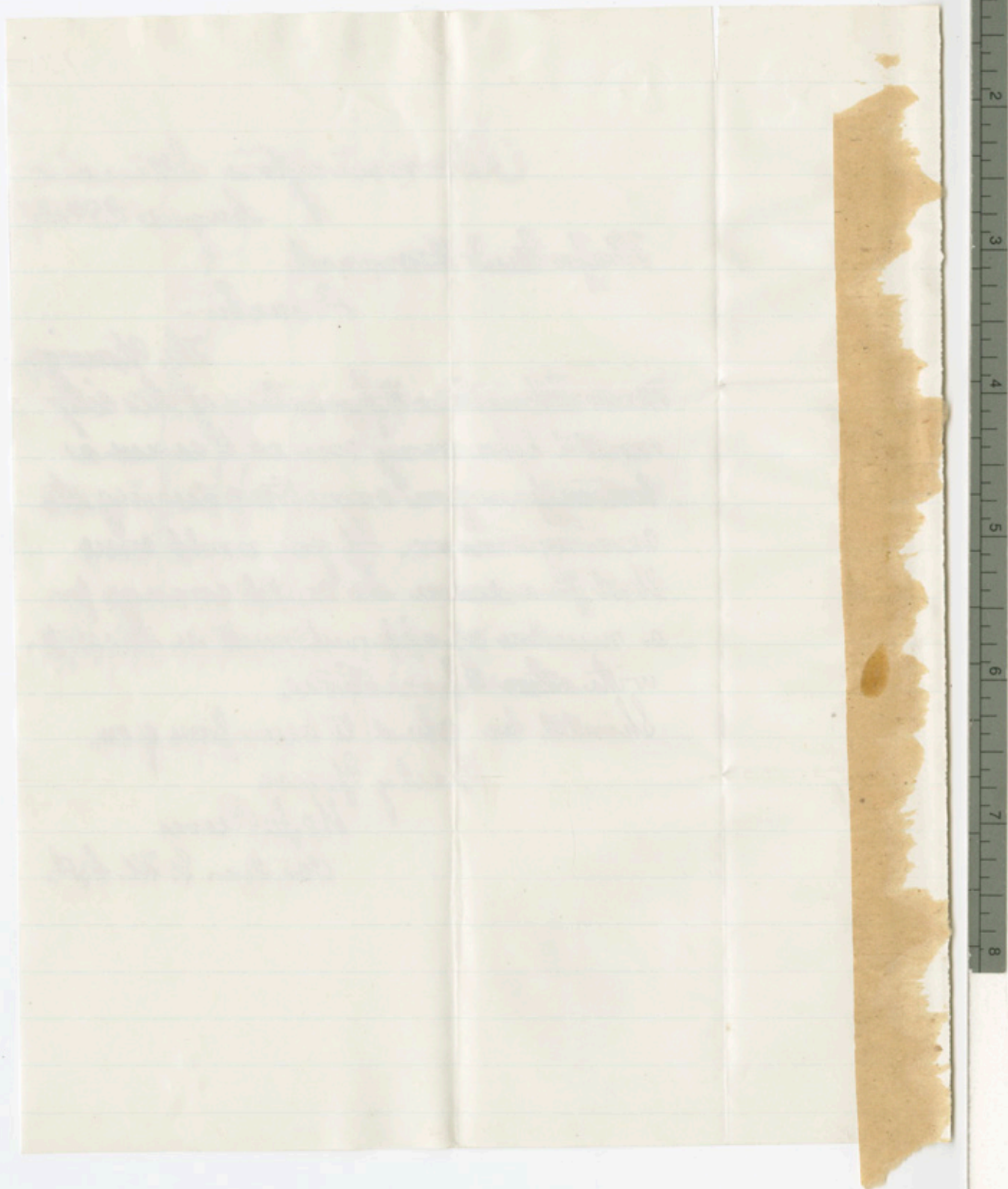

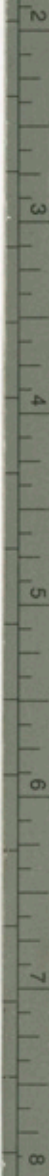

I have just received
from W. Waring of Florence Ala.
one of our Freedmen's teachers, a copy
of your Circular No. 22. July 1. '67
in reference to transportation of
teachers, sent to him by Rev W.
Buckley sup^t of Education for that
State. W Waring had applied for
the return of money expended by him
for transportation from Philad to
Florence, which in accordance
with this circular W Buckley
had to refuse.

I now apply to you for the
same & trust in view of the facts
of the Case you will grant it.
W Waring had gone to Philad in June

on Gov! transportation from Florence
where he had been teaching the last
year.

Neither W Waring nor I were
aware, at all, of such an order having
been issued, until after he arrived
at Florence. W Waring had come
to Pittsburgh, on his way back, to
consult with us about the school,
and if possible to secure the
continuance of the school. He
was detained here by circumstances
beyond the control of either of us,
waiting the decision of our Board
as to the continuance of our school
this year or not. It was so
difficult to raise money or secure
pledges, that we could not decide
until early in this month that
we would go on. As soon as
that decision was made Waring
was exceedingly anxious to be off.
To Alabama, to be at work, especially

as he had been at considerable ex-
pense here already. If either of us
had known of your order, of course
I should have applied for transpor-
tation as in the case of Mr. Nichols
& Miss Lyon. But as we had former-
ly received back money expended
for transportation & knew of nothing
to the contrary, thought it better, in
the emergency to send him along with-
out delay. There was, not the
slightest disposition to violate orders,
choose routes or spend a cent un-
necessarily. I trust the frank
statement of these facts will be
all that is necessary.

If funds were ample with
us, I should hardly make this ap-
plication, but such is not the fact.
In our anxiety to do all we could
with our funds, in having as many
schools as possible, we have calcu-
lated so closely that I fear it will

be necessary to reduce the length
of our school year if we do not
have this money returned, espe-
cially as I notice that return
transportation is not to be furnish-
ed hereafter. From past experience
we had calculated on both.
Waring as I have said to you
before is one of our very best
teachers. If I can possibly
raise the money to furnish
the necessary books, he thinks
he can set two or three new
schools going in adjacent
neighborhoods, without addition-
al expense.

The actual amt. paid out for
R.R. fare from Philad to Florence
was as follows -

Philad to Pitts	\$11.
Pitts to Nashville	25.
Nashville to Tusculum	8.
Tusculum to Florence	\$43.

I do not know what it would have cost
the Govt. but whatever amt. you see fit
to allow will be satisfactory, and shall
be glad to forward any requisite funds.
