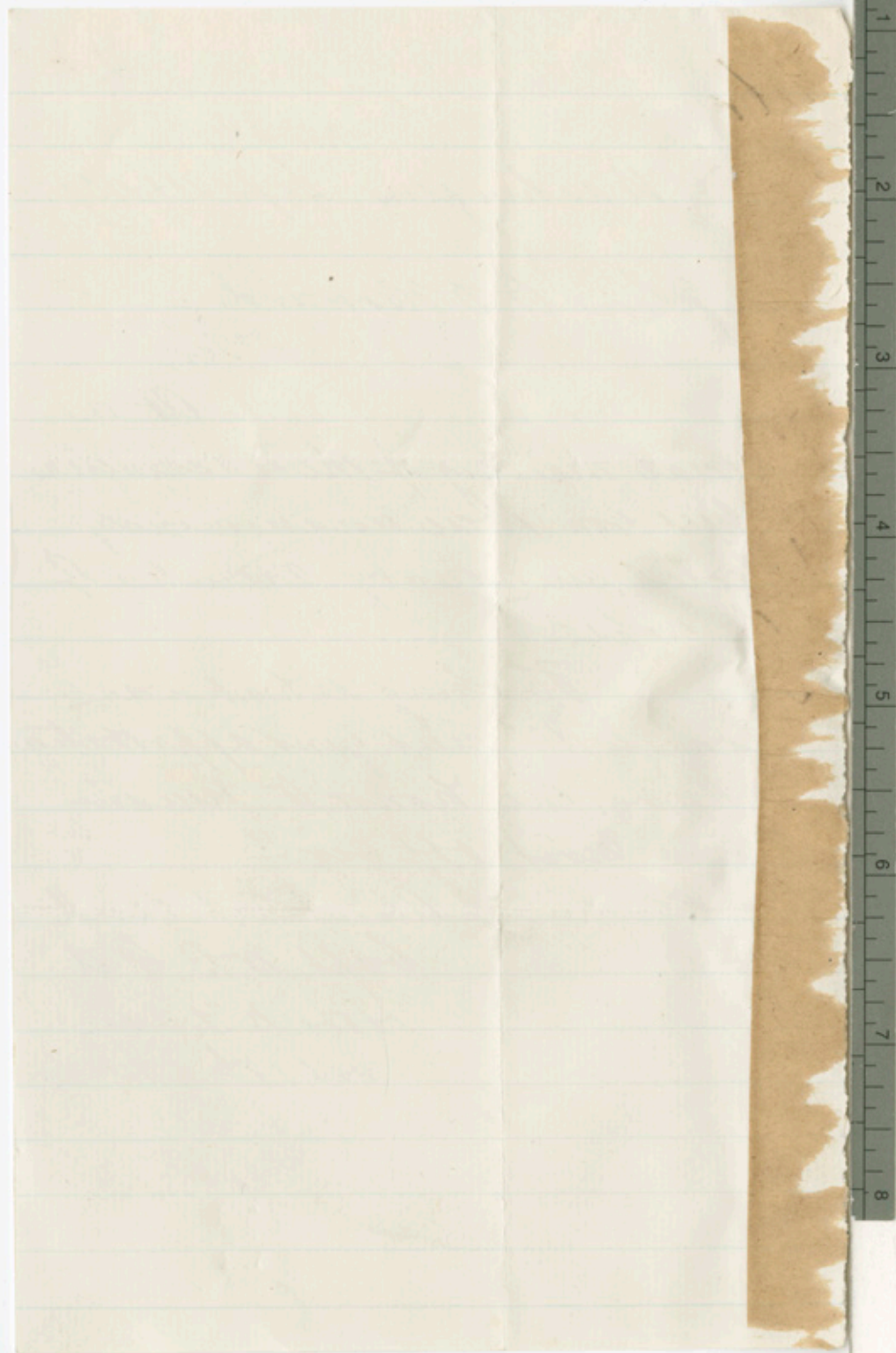

To the Congregational Churches of Connecticut.

DEAR BRETHREN:

The readiness with which the churches responded last year to the appeal of the General Association for funds, has convinced the ministers that these churches are willing, of their abundance, to bear the whole cost of the annual expenses of this body; and accordingly, at the recent annual meeting, the following resolutions were adopted:

“RESOLVED, That 1,800 copies of the Minutes be published and distributed as usual.

“RESOLVED, That the Treasurer invite the churches to contribute toward defraying the expenses of the General Association, at the rate of two cents for each church member.”

The ministers, in proposing to dispense with the yearly tax, which has been customary since 1800, —and to ask the churches to meet henceforth this expenditure, have been influenced by the following considerations: The ministers themselves are the servants of the churches, and the business done by the General Association is done for the good of the churches.
