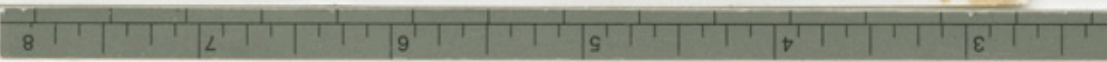

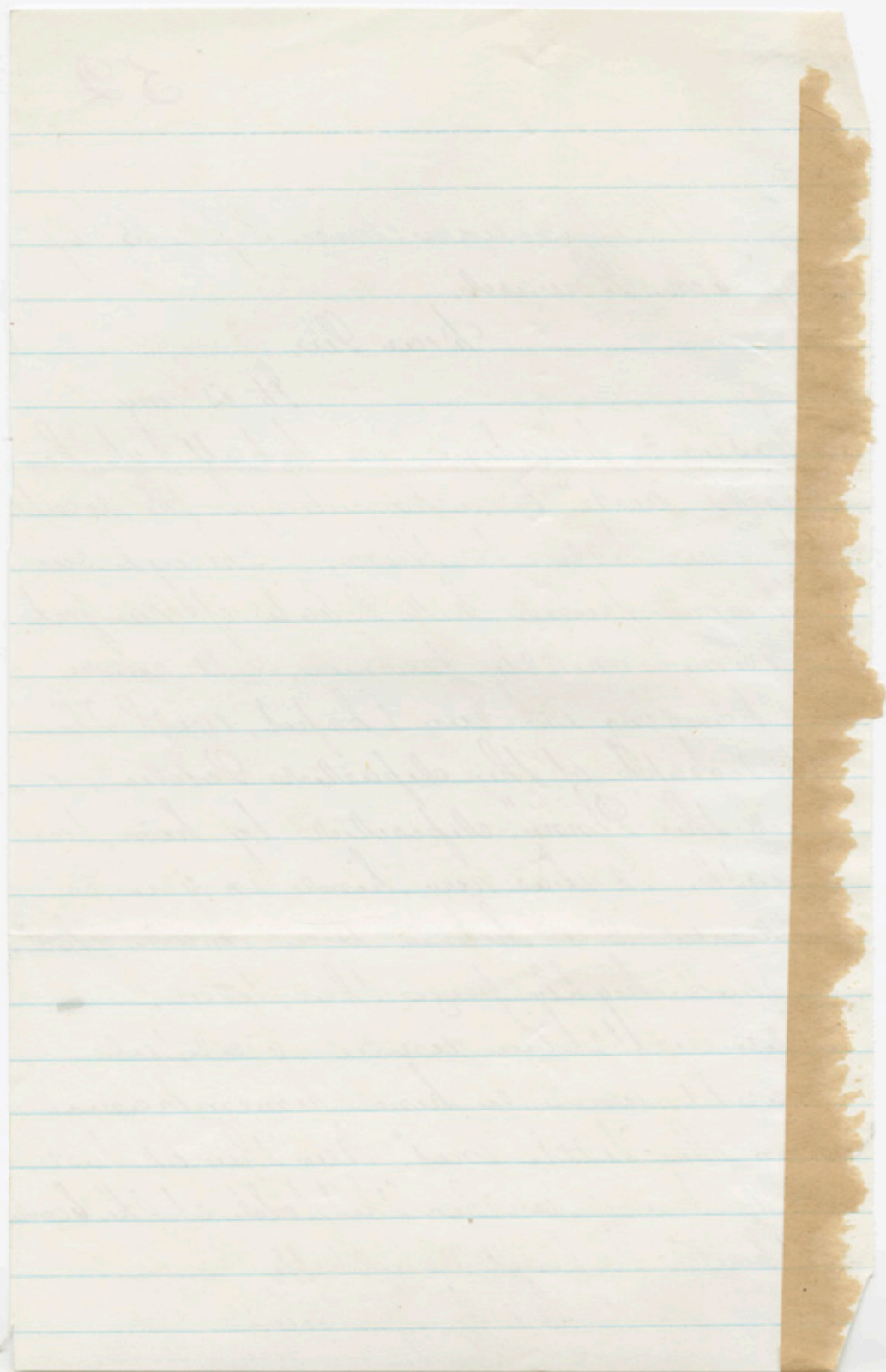

My dear Linnell

I am on the way
to Chicago, stopping at different
places en route, by request
of our Board, to see influen-
tial & leading men, with a
view of awakening them to
think of the country as
a more lively & intelligent
interest - in the great
question of popular
education at the South.
I have had fairly frequent
interviews with both
older, at Prince George's, and
for Frederick Douglass at
Newark, since I came
over at Starbuck &
others. I found them

all sadly deficient of information in regard to what was doing, but desirous to be informed and with and even eager to act in their official as well as private capacities. Mr. Frothingham and Mr. Cameron were both clear that the Government ought to act in the matter. Mr. Cameron said: "You men who have studied the subject should set up a bill or measure plan, and give it to us; we will put it through." I told him that it was in

contemplation to do so.
That I had heard you
express purely as in
favor of letting the
Russian Empire by
limitation, and then
handing over all
your Machinery &
appliances to the
Government to be
employed in such
a way as would be
consistent with the
Government's powers
in the matter, and
as would at the

same time meet the exigencies
of the crisis, at the very
expressed satisfaction.

He good enough to
drop me a line saying in
a few words what is your
idea of what had best
be done in the case.

I shall see many lead-
ing men in the West. My
business of educating some
millions of new voters is one
of pressing importance and
will admit of no postponement.
This is the crucial
year; the year in which
this educational nail
must be driven in and
clinched. Direct firmly
to Chicago. All
