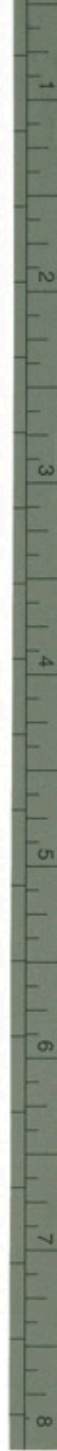

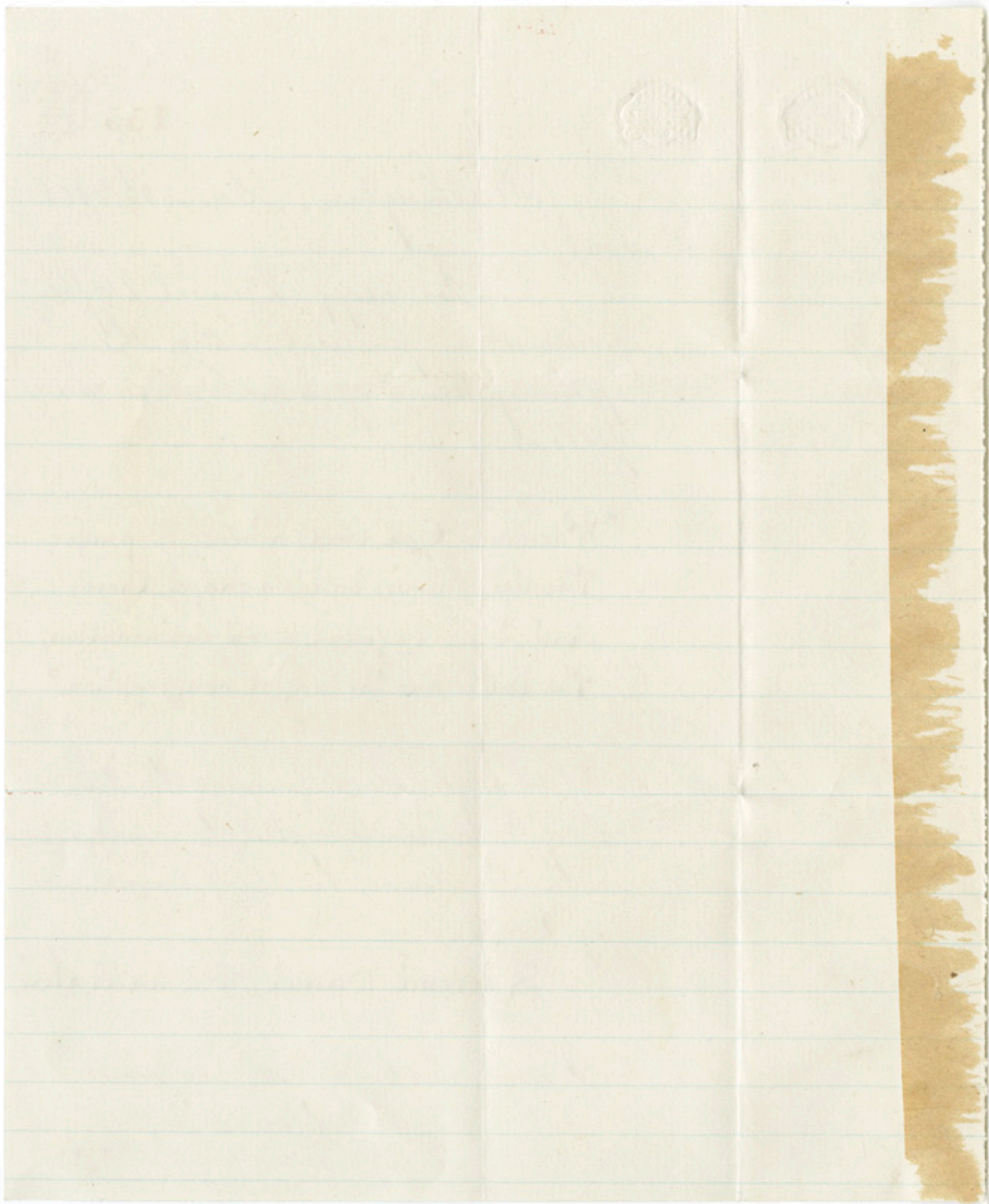
In 1699, Daniel Defoe produced a poetical satire, the opening lines of which were as follows:

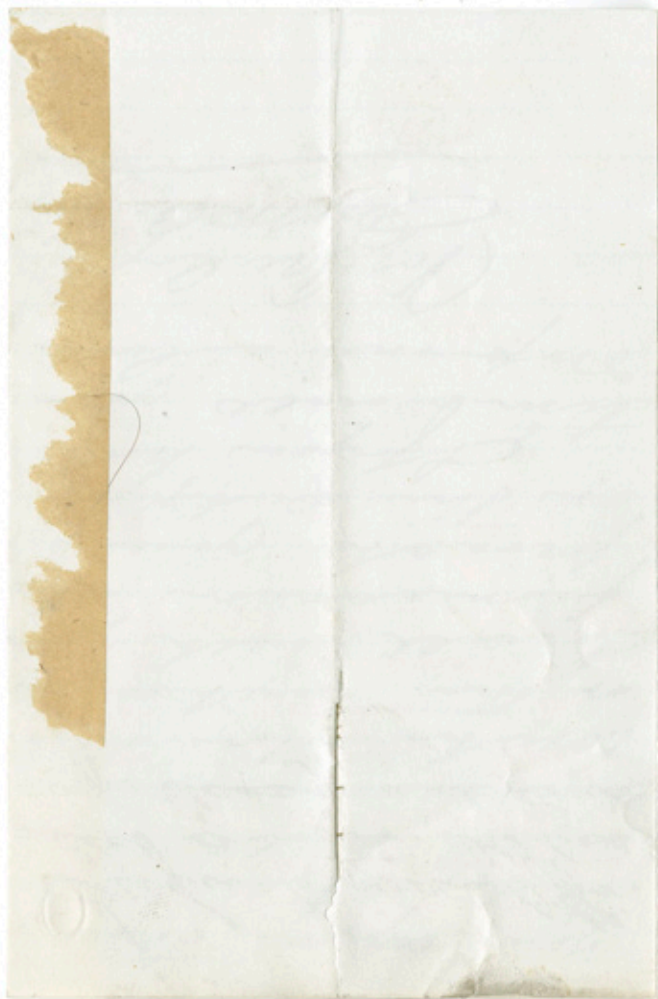

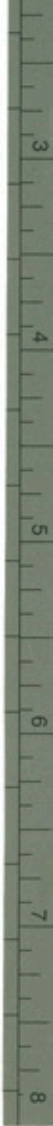
