



a misquotation from the report on which said letter was based, and should have reads the entire records of some of the local offices or agencies are missing The fact that the records are non found to be so extensively deficient, serves to confirm the views entertained by an officer of your Staff (Lient. J. A. Staden) who, in a letter addreford & Gen. 6. Whittlesey, A. A. A. Gent. Surean A. J. Y A Lounder date of December 13.1869, states I am inclined to believe that many of the agent. on their discharge, took with them either the books or the papers, or both, or if not all, at least a great part of the records of their office. Alfon the letter of Link Staden, it Jeens, was based your Circular, As. 8. of December 15.1869, the requirements of which were, evidencely, in great masure disregarded.

While the inconvenience weresarily resulting from the absence of so large a partion of the records is too self-evident to require islustration, it is, nevertheless, thought well to make mention of the matter of purchases of property by the late Bureau, to be used for educational purposes. Many of such transactions have already become subjects of litigation, and applications are frequently made to this office for information affecting title to in order that the right of those holding the property in question, by transfer from the late Bureau, may be properly defended. In but few, if any, cases that have thus far arisen, has the office been able to furnish the information called for, and probably essential to the retention of property donated to trustees or others by the government for the furfoses stated. In such, and kindred cases, has the want of a full and ferfect record been already made plainly manifest,





-We have received a copy of the Sante Fe Post, which contains so complimentary a mention of Mr. Curtis, that we present it to our readers entire:

The number of Indians at the Agency has been considerably increased within a few weeks, and the fame thereof is becoming so widely known that red men of all the tribes are seeking its protection. To-day there arrived 30 from the Canada Alamosa who will return in a day or two with the glad tidings to their people that there is one spot left of all their vast possessions where they will receive justice tempered with kindness and mercy. The wide spread desire on the part of the "lost tribes" to "break of our bread, and eat of our salt" is not entirely due to the purity of our waters, abundance of game and salubrity of climate, but is mainly attributable to the zeal and untiring energy with which Mr. Curtis, their agent, has endeavored to convince them that he is their friend. The Indian is no fool, and can see as far into a mill-stone as his more enlightened brother, and being by nature more suspicious, can sooner detect the true from the false. I am no particular admirer of the Indian, but an experience of over twenty years has satisfied me that if once his entire confidence is gained, it is not easily withdrawn. The Agent for the Mescaleros has instilled this confidence or I am much deceived, and the popularity of his agency is the natural result. I do not write this to flatter Mr. Curtis, but with the hope that other Indian Agents who consider that their whole duty consists in doling out the cold charity (?) of the Government may be led to follow his example and become the friend of the Indian as well as the Agent of the Government. Was this the universal rule of conduct adopted, there would be less obstacles placed in the way of carrying out the humane policy of the Government, and far less cause of complaint on the part of the settler. In the name of the people of Lincoln county, I thank the President for sending us so efficient an officer as Indian Agent Curtis.



Referring to your note of The 29th cett, in regard to the condition of the records of the Bureau R. F. and A. L. previous to transfer to the War Department, I have the honor to make the following reply:

The records of the Adjutant Keneral's Office of the Peureaus evene in good condition, papers arranged and filed away in cases, provided for the purpose, together with complete volumes of Letters Received", and Letters Leut", accompained by index books, all kept nearly complete until during the last Jew months existence of the Qureau, when it was impossible to perform the work with the very small force allowed by the appropriations.

This statement is especially true of the records of the educational department rept at Head quarters. " "

On withdrawing the Bureau from the South, except the bounty branch, it was found that the records sent up from the various states required considerable work in so preparing them that, clerks wholly unfamiliar with them, might obtain with Jacility in formation daily called for in your own office, and especially

Months were spent with a clerk or two, taken from some other equally important duty, in doing something towards arranging assorting, labelling and indexing these records in order that the reports, referred to might be given without delay. These records, known as the archives, including the books and papers of the discontinued educational department, were all arranged in good and neat order by states in two large rooms provided with every convenience for the furpose, and together with those of the adjutant Renerals affice, were the only records under my immediate control.
