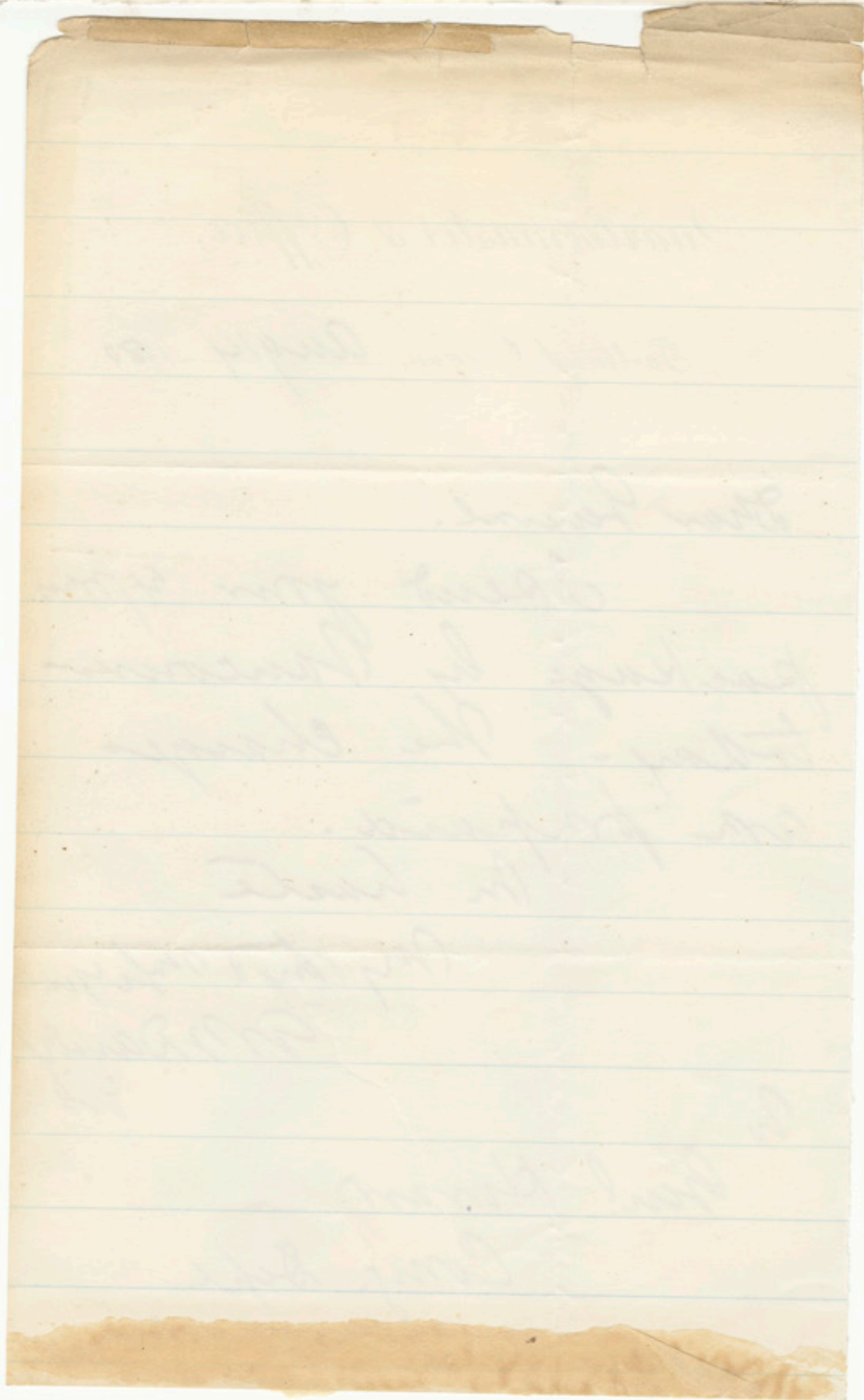
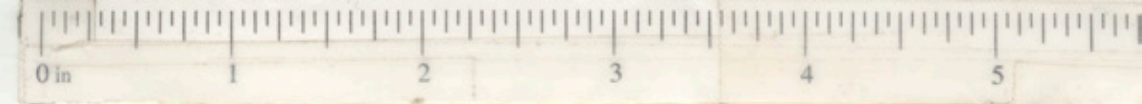

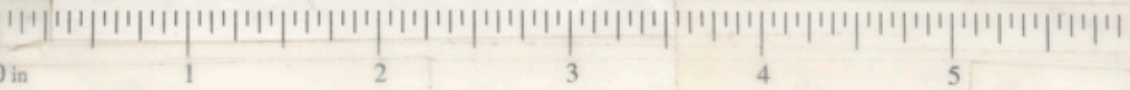

Dear Sir:

Your kind note as well as letters to heads of departments in this city, are received and duly forwarded. I enclose the replies of Mr. Dodge & the Chief Clerk of the Surveyor Genl's Office: They gave me no hope as they say from forty to seventy five applications are already on file.

I can see no course for me to pursue but to return, at least, as far as Portland & endeavor to gain an interview with my husband. I don't see how he can possibly visit my pleadings when he sees our child: He was much better when I returned but sadly needing a



Mother's care: I think by the  
first of September I can safely  
return with her.

There is no employment of any  
kind that I can obtain here.  
I saw the fruitfulness of efforts ~~in~~  
that direction long before Mr.  
Cade sent me his summons.  
My friends are extremely in-  
dignant at his conduct, know-  
ing as they do, how innocent  
I am of all his complaints, and  
they declare, if I do not return  
& insist on his supporting me,  
they will prefer charges against  
him: you are her powerful  
I am to exert their action here  
by doing as they suggest.

I am willing to do anything  
my health & strength will jus-  
tify my undertaking, but as  
young a child and of so delicate  
a constitution, fully occupies

my time and attention.

I depend greatly on you: I  
feel assured that if you were to  
order Mr. Cade to renew on  
some temporary service & to allow  
me to meet him it would  
be the best plan & I entreat  
you to do this for me before he  
has time to proceed to his com-  
pany's post at Colville. Of course  
I should not like Mr. Cade to  
know I had suggested such  
order as it would only irritate  
him and so prevent the good  
that might result. If I can  
make arrangements I shall  
start on either the 29<sup>th</sup> of this  
month or the 3<sup>rd</sup> of September: there  
will then be some fifty four  
dollars due on my bond to  
Sept. 1<sup>st</sup>. & my landlady is al-  
ready impatient at the long  
delay in receiving her money.

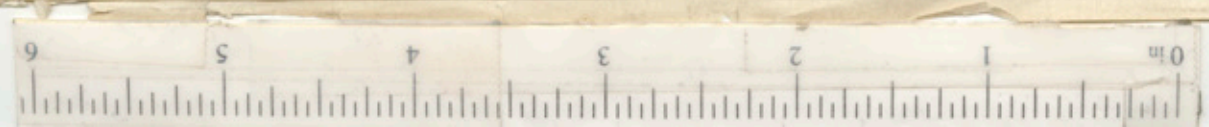

It was with regret I failed to see you, either on  
your trip to, or return from Fort Lapwai. As regards  
the subjects mentioned in your letter. I had the  
matter of Capt. Mann's visiting the Pen. de. Ind.  
Country under consideration some little time.  
As to its advisability, or the disposition to  
be made of the hostiles should they return.  
I have asked him a favor to visit them  
and he has been gone nearly a week. If they  
return it is with the understanding they  
are to be dealt with as the Department  
may direct, what success he will have  
in bringing in the men. remains to be





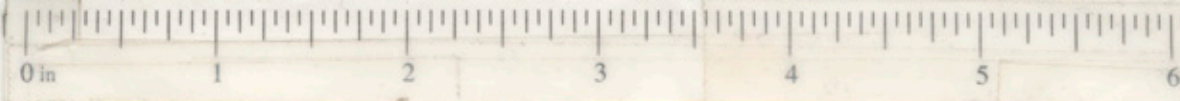


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See. Could they be eliminated from  
among the "Spokane" I believe it to be a  
wise proceeding. As regards the encroachment  
on the reservation the "lines" are so indistinct  
-ly marked it is impossible to take any definite  
action. The stakes are down and the holes  
filled up. The matter was reported to the  
Department some time since, with the sug-  
-gestion the lines be rerun and properly  
marked when definite action could be  
taken, you will perceive the impossibility of  
action while this. Accept my appreciation  
of the interest manifested in your letter and  
trust it may be your fortune to meet on  
your next visit to Fort Lapwai.
