Dear Gen Howard -

I shall try
this morning to answer some
of the points as fully as
needful.

First, we must assure you again
of our gratification with your decision
to take a claim & an interest
with us. Your name & yourself
will be invaluable to our enterprise.
We feel deeply that your coming
with us is a token of God's favor.

Second, your questions: "How can
I start it? When must I begin living
on it? And where is the locality?"
we will answer, beginning with the
last one. The locality is on
Vashon Island (12 m by 2 to 4 m) just

Midway between Tacoma & Seattle. The Academy site fronts on a sheltered little bay (wh we have named Bradford after Gov Bradford) & overlooks the Sound eastward & the vessels that pass up & down. It is on a beautifully sloping knoll in N 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ of Sec 8, Township 22 North, Range 3 East. The claim wh we think of for you adjoins the above on the west, being the NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of Sec 8. It is a good claim - a good upland claim with some swale & hardback swamp - this wh or along side of wh it is proposed to open a road from the back settlement down to Quartermaster harbor on the south & over to the Academy. We are sorry there is nothing on the bay vacant - as there is not without taking a small fraction of the 160 acres or going around the point north. But with the NW $\frac{1}{4}$ you wd be but 2 m from

the water.

Still we wd not wish to select for you. You ought by all means to see the region & make choice after personal inspection.

The other questions we might attempt to answer but cd not do so well as the Register in the U S land office at Vancouver. Our place is not in his district but he can give you the information explicit & exact. Inquire of him for the laws made for soldiers in active service wh you might wish to have the benefit of.

One thing we wd call attention to - the early filing ^{for} of your claim. This looks hopeful for the Sound country & our Island ^{is} attracting attention. We want you located before some one gets in whom we wd rather keep out.





Received at New Tacoma 16 - 12 m

To General Howard Tacoma
Adjutant general's letters of August
sixteenth and September twenty ninth
direct that your engineer office
ascertain latitude and telegraph longitude
of Vancouver Point and Lapwai. These
letters Symons was not aware of until
his return from field work. Then he
was suddenly sent to Skagit. To carry
out these instructions it is necessary
to have telegraphic communication with
astronomical observatory that weather
be clear at both places a combination
hardly to be hoped for at this late
season and which would be the cause
of great delays. The most available
observatory Ogden is closed for the
season. He has been unable to find
one with which he could exchange
signals. In view of these facts as well
as great delay in essential office work
by continued absence Symons asks if
you will obtain delay of work till
next season winter has already set in
up country with rain and snow
