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

Dear Brethren:

The Sixteenth Annual Meeting of the State Association of Young Men's Christian Associations will be held in the First Presbyterian Church at Auburn, Feb. 16-19, 1882.

The opening session will begin at 3:30 P. M., on Thursday, Feb. 16th, and the farewell meeting will take place on the Sunday evening following.

The Annual Meeting of the General and Executive Secretaries of the State will be held at Syracuse, commencing on Tuesday morning of the same week, at 10 o'clock, and closing Wednesday evening.

The past year has been one of steady and encouraging growth. Marked progress has been made toward the establishment of our work on a more permanent and substantial basis, by the erection of buildings, the accumulation of building-funds and the employment of General Secretaries. The Committee has secured the attendance of Rev. Theodore L. Cuyler, D. D., of Brooklyn, Rev. Charles N. Sims, D. D., LL. D., Chancellor of Syracuse University, and Rev. Augustus H. Strong, D. D., LL. D., President of Rochester Theological Seminary, who will address the evening sessions of the Convention.

The number of Delegates is not restricted, and the benefit which Associations receive from a full representation leads the Committee to urge each Association to avail itself of the opportunity which the occasion affords.

Arrangements are in progress for social conferences of College Students and Railroad Men at private residences in Auburn, on Friday afternoon, February 17th, and gentlemen belonging to these classes are particularly urged to be with us that day and evening.

Christian young men from towns where there are no Associations, or from Young People's Associations of churches, will be heartily welcomed to the privileges of the Convention.

The credentials of such should be signed by the pastors of the churches to which they belong.

The credentials enclosed (more will be sent if desired) are to be filled out, and presented to the Credential Committee by delegates upon their arrival at the rooms in Auburn.

Representatives of the Auburn Association, wearing blue badges, will meet the trains upon the arrival of the delegates on Thursday and escort them to the rooms, where a lunch will be provided, and they will be assigned to homes.

The friends of the Auburn Association kindly offer entertainment to all delegates, but as some prefer to provide for themselves at hotels, the following reduced rates have been secured: Osborn, Gaylord and National Houses, \$2 per day.

The Committee of Arrangements at Auburn would be glad to secure the names of the delegates who expect to be present, before the 15th inst. Address
