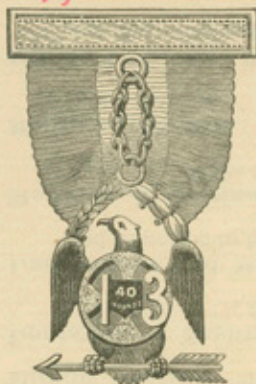

- Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe.**—Will sell round trip tickets to Kansas City or Atchison at $1\frac{1}{4}$ fare for round trip.
- Burlington & Mo. River** (in Neb.)—Will sell round trip tickets to Atchison, Nebraska City or Omaha at $1\frac{1}{4}$ fare for round trip.
- Baltimore & Ohio** (Lines East of Ohio River).—Will sell round trip tickets to Parkersburg at 2 cents per mile, each way.
- Baltimore & Ohio** (Lines West of Ohio River).—Will sell round trip tickets to Defiance or Chicago at 2 cents per mile, each way.
- "Bee Line."**—Will return members at $\frac{1}{3}$ fare to Indianapolis, Cincinnati, Columbus, Cleveland, and all local points.
- Central of Iowa.**—Will sell round trip tickets to St. Louis at $1\frac{1}{3}$ fare for round trip.
- Cincinnati, New Orleans & Texas Pacific.**—Will permit all lines leading out of St. Louis to return members to any point on their line at $\frac{1}{3}$ fare.

Chicago & Alton.—Will return members to Chicago, Kansas City and all other local points at $\frac{1}{2}$ fare.

Chicago & North Western, Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific. } Will return members from Chicago to all local points on their respective lines at $\frac{1}{2}$ fare.

Cincinnati, Indianapolis, St. Louis & Chicago.—Will return members from Lafayette or Indianapolis to Cincinnati and all other local points at $\frac{1}{2}$ fare.

Ohio & Mississippi.—Will return members to Louisville, Cincinnati and local points at $\frac{1}{2}$ fare.

Pittsburgh, Cincinnati & St. Louis.—Return members from Chicago or Indianapolis to Columbus, Pittsburgh and other local points at $\frac{1}{2}$ fare.

Pittsburgh, Ft. Wayne & Chicago.—Return members from Chicago or Ft. Wayne to Pittsburgh and other local points at $\frac{1}{2}$ fare.

St. Louis, Iron Mountain & Southern.—Return members to Columbus, Little Rock, Texarkana and other local points at $\frac{1}{2}$ fare.

St. Louis, Keokuk & North Western (Keokuk and St. Louis Line).—Return members to Hannibal, Quincy, Keokuk, Burlington and other local points at $\frac{1}{2}$ fare.

St. Louis & San Francisco.—Return members to Springfield, Rolla and other local points at $\frac{1}{2}$ fare.

Vandalia Line.—Return members to Indianapolis, Cincinnati, Louisville, Columbus, Pittsburgh, Chicago, and to all local points on their line, as well as to local points on the Illinois Central R. R., at $\frac{1}{2}$ fare.

Wabash, St. Louis & Pacific.—Return members to Chicago, Kansas City, St. Joseph, Council Bluffs, Ottumwa, Danville, Lafayette, Ft. Wayne, Defiance, Toledo, Detroit and all other local points at $\frac{1}{2}$ fare.

Several important lines who were applied to have not yet been heard from; therefore, members residing on lines that are not mentioned herein, should apply to H. C. Townsend, Secretary.

It is very important that all members who desire to avail themselves of the reduced rates should communicate at once with Col. D. Murphy, Secretary Executive Committee, Temple Building, St. Louis, as all of the roads require a certificate as a means of proper identification, which is either to be presented to the ticket agent at the starting point, on which to procure a round trip ticket, or is to be obtained of the Secretary, at the meeting in St. Louis, on which a return ticket at the reduced rate is to be issued, as the custom of the road may require. Members will readily see this requires time, and a prompt response is very desirable.

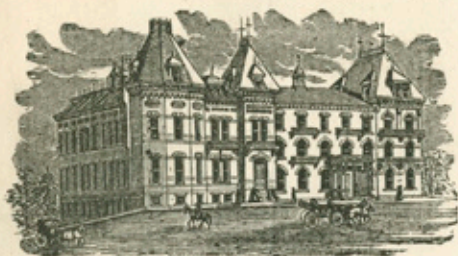

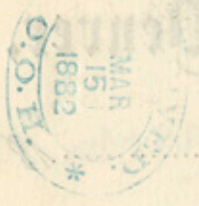
