I have this day mailed you copy of the "Academy Bill" as it passed the Senate, — the amendments being in Italics.

I think the amendments will be accepted by the House Committee. If any <sup>further</sup> changes are needed, you must communicate with me at once.

I wish to call your attention to a request of my brother "Blackburn" who is much interested in the parties in question. He wishes, first, to have the detail of First Lieut. Geo. E. Bacon, extended for another year or for two years, if possible; second, to have Lt. Joseph Oyster, detailed as Tactical officer, to take charge of the light Battery of Artillery. If you can consistently gratify Mr. Blackburn in his desires, I think it will be wise policy as he will be one of the Board of Visitors next year.

Dear General:

I had intended not to write you until I could return the promisory note which you so kindly endorsed for me, and upon which I will make the final payment on the 15<sup>th</sup> prox. But circumstances have occurred here in the Dept. recently which cause me to change my resolution. In a word, General, our mutual friend Dr. Howard needs your influence and is too modest to ask it; — and I am just mean enough to trouble you in his behalf. By the resignation of a 3<sup>rd</sup> class Clk. in the doctor's division a vacancy has been made to which the Dr. is in a direct line of promotion, and it needs just such backing as you can furnish to secure him the place. Dr. H. has been such a staunch, devoted friend to myself, wife & little ones that I am presumptuous enough to feel sure for our sake you will be pleased to do him a service. For five long years, and without a single fee, he has not only ever been ready to call, night or day, and attend me when ill, but has time and again furnished medicine when I was without the means to provide it. Next to yourself, General,

he is the truest friend I ever had.

Independent of all this, however, the doctor thinks, and with good reason, that he has not been treated altogether right in the Dept. I have been at work in the same room with him for several months and in private conversation have learned some of his grievances. He has trusted for preferment entirely to his merits as a clerk, without asking political influence from any one. But you know, General, merit don't win when pitted against good political backing. I have said as much to the doctor, but he thinks four years service during the war - from private to surgeon in the Maine Vols., and some twenty-five years earnest work as a Republican entitles him to some consideration - especially from Maine men. I feel satisfied, General, that a good strong letter from you now to the P. M. General, or to Blaine, or Frye, or Reed of Maine - or any other good man of influence with the administration, would be of incalculable good at this time, and cause favorable action to an application he now has on file for promotion. So, please, Genl., add one more kindness to the long list you have against me by granting this favor. I should be so proud to have Mr. Howard know that I sometimes think

of him without a selfish motive.

Upon each occasion of your last three visits here I tried to find you - went each time to the Ebbitt & other hotels, but could not get on your track till too late. Was real sorry I had left the office on the occasion of your visit to my room in company with the Dr. General, do let me know when you are coming to W. again and where I can find you.

I hope you are doing nicely <sup>at</sup> and are well pleased with, your new Post. I take it from the absence of any unfavorable criticism of your administration of affairs, in the public press, that matters at the Academy are pleasing everybody.

Sir.

The first State encampment of the Militia of this State will be held July 1<sup>st</sup> to 6<sup>th</sup> inclusive. During the encampment we will have series of Competitive drills, participated in by not only Indiana troops but by those of other States. I write you at this time asking that you give me the names of four or five of the Cadets who will graduate at West Point this year. I wish those who are most proficient in the tactics, so that I may ask the War Dept. to detail them as Judges for the drill. I think they, being right fresh from the study of the tactics, will be better judges than older Army Officers who may have grown rusty on drill. I will esteem it a great favor if you will give me this information at a very early day. I prefer that these names should be from other States than Tennessee, La-~~La~~, or Mo, as all of these States will have competitors, and I do not wish any charge of partiality to be raised.
