

My Dear Gen. - Many thanks for your kind letter - I am glad the lectures prove interesting. The Grand Lodge in their last annual meeting decided to print them in their report for universal distribution. And my own Lodge are clamoring for other lectures. I am reading them Hollands "Plain Talks", &c. and am gratified by a full attendance, and of course am hoping that, somehow - some time - some way - they will be better men for my exertions -

This constant toil - constant struggle for something to eat seems to prevent any other feeling getting a hold upon them I think if men - working men - could first be persuaded to become thinking men - if they could only get away from the constant anxiety of their toilsome lives. They would become better men. but when they are constantly harassed by the fear of discharge - when the "Daily bread" question is always uppermost in their minds they will not - can not heed any thing else. I know in my own case my last thought on going to sleep, and my first one upon waking is "how shall I best do the work given into my hands" - and I have no rest from that. all my brain power is required in my business - and the constant anxiety is always pressing on me as to whether I am neglecting something - whether can I not do more & better work for my employers -

I dined with Gen'l Cook Sunday & had the pleasure of meeting Col. Mason. My Bookkeeper is away and has been made death in consequence. I hope to go East next month in which event I will stop over one day in Omaha & will have the pleasure of seeing you. With great respect & every kind regards Langford Hill -




