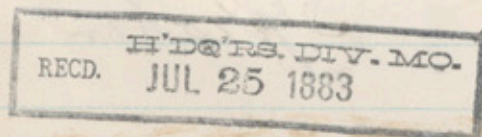

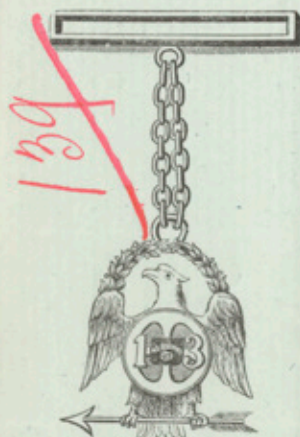

Mon cher Père

Je ne vous ai pas écrit, il
y a long temps. Certainement
vous lisez les lettres que j'é-
cris à ma mère, ainsi je ne
vous écris ^{pas} si souvent. Il sem-
ble un peu drôle, que de venir
en Allemagne et d'écrire en
français à une personne dont
la langue est anglaise. Mais
il vaut mieux le faire; cela
est un bon exercice pour
moi. La dernière lettre que
j'ai reçue de "Horn" est une de
ma mère, écrite le 10 juin et re-
çue le 4 juillet. C'est à dire, je n'ai
point de lettre d'Annie pendant
presque vingt jours. C'est moi,
qui l'ai arrangé ainsi, car
j'ai écrit de Genève le 15 juin
que j'allais partir pour l'Alle-
magne et de ne plus envoyer
des lettres à Genève, et de plus,
d'attendre jusqu'à ce que je vous

écrivains de Göttingen. J'ai écrit
une carte postale et à mon arrivée
ici — cela fut le 28 juin; et
parcequ'il faut attendre un mois
avant que j'aie une réponse,
je ne m'attends^{pas} une lettre
avant le 28 juillet, — encore
une semaine.

Hier j'ai
reçu un "Harper's Weekly" envoyé
par M. Mallet au même temps
qu'une description du "Brook-
lyn bridge", lesquels journaux
m'intéressent beaucoup, et
je veux remercier Mallet de
toutes ses attentions. La der-
