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

My dear General

I am back on my own brash again and wish to
say that I have been off of it.
I found, by some telegraphy, that
it was possible to spend Sunday
with General & Miss Terry in El.
Paso and I did so. Here gotten
back here en route to Fort Bayard.
I found the Bolony boy of the
U.S. Army at last. Terry thinks
he has it in Fort Bliss, but if
I could have persuaded him to
take a drive up the Gila Valley
to Fort Thomas I know he would

has yielded the prize to the
Military division of the Pacific.
Should it not be possible to do
away with the miserable place?

I have carefully looked over the
situation, and it seems to me
that by strengthening Fort Grant,
and keeping Fort Apache fully
garrisoned, that Fort Thomas might
be entirely abandoned. If it can not
be abandoned I am decidedly of the
opinion that the garrison should be
reduced to the minimum and enough
money appropriated to make their
men comfortable. As it now stands
the post is over garrisoned - There
are barracks for three small companies
and quarters for nine officers

There are now four companies
in the garrison and one at San Carlos,
the offices of which hold quarters
at Fort Thomas. One company at the
post is under canvas and were the
one at San Carlos sent back it would also
have to go under canvas. There are a
good many empty barracks at Fort
Grant and two empty sets of poor
barracks. It would I think be for
the comfort of these people if the two
Infantry Companies were taken from
Thomas to Grant. The Gila valley has
a good many Mormon communities
in it, and they are abundantly able
to take care of themselves without his
post, and if they would not prowl
themselves I do not think they would
