



Referring to your letter of the 12th instant, for which I thank you because of the sentiments expressed in bringing the complaint of Mrs. Wilson to my notice by personal rather than official letter; I would say, that she wrote me of the matter about a year ago. In reply I said that the claim appeared to me remarkable, in that the services were rendered in 1881 or 2 and nothing had been said to me of non payment of bill. That I had no receipt showing payment, nor could I say positively I had ever paid it but thought I had, and farthermore it seemed singular that I was allowed to leave San Francisco without a reminder, if I owed That she was not at the house in the capacity of monthly nurse for five weeks, which she knew, and in no event would I pay her \$75.00. More recently I received from her a letter in which I was informed if I did not pay the bill she would report me to military authority --- that letter I took no notice of. Mr. McKenna introduced the following bill:

## A BILL

To amend the laws governing the militia of the United States.

- Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- That the militia of the United States shall consist of every
- able-bodied male citizen of the several States who is of the
- 5 age of eighteen years and under the age of forty-five years.
- SEC. 2. That the militia of the several States of the Union
- shall be divided into two classes, the organized and the re-
- 3 serve.
- SEC. 3. That the organized militia shall consist of the
- organized militia of the several States of the United States,
- 3 known as the national guard or volunteer militia, organized
- 4 and equipped under the laws of the several States.
- SEC. 4. That it shall be the duty of the Secretary of
- 2 War, at the request of the governors of the respective States,

- 3 to detail Regular Army officers to instruct the militia in mili-
- 4 tary duties and in the use of sea-coast and garrison artillery.
- 1 SEC. 5. That at the request of the governor of any State
- 2 the Secretary of War shall furnish to the State heavy guns,
- 3 siege, sea-coast and mortars, for the instruction of the militia,
- 4 the number not to exceed six pieces and to be delivered at a
- 5 place designated by the governor of the State.
- 1 SEC. 6. That the War Department, upon the request of
- 2 the governor of any State, shall furnish to the militia camp
- 3 and garrison equipage during State encampments or at any
- 4 time when any portion of the militia is mobilized for public
- 5 service, upon conditions prescribed by the Secretary of War.
- 1 SEC. 7. That a bureau shall be established in the War
- 2 Department, to be called the Bureau of Militia, to be organ-
- 3 ized for the purpose of aiding and giving necessary instruction
- 4 and all useful information for the purpose of increasing the
- 5 efficiency of the militia of the several States.
- 1 SEC. 8. That all laws inconsistent with this act are
- 2 hereby repealed.
- 1 SEC. 9. That this act is to take effect immediately from
- 2 its passage.
