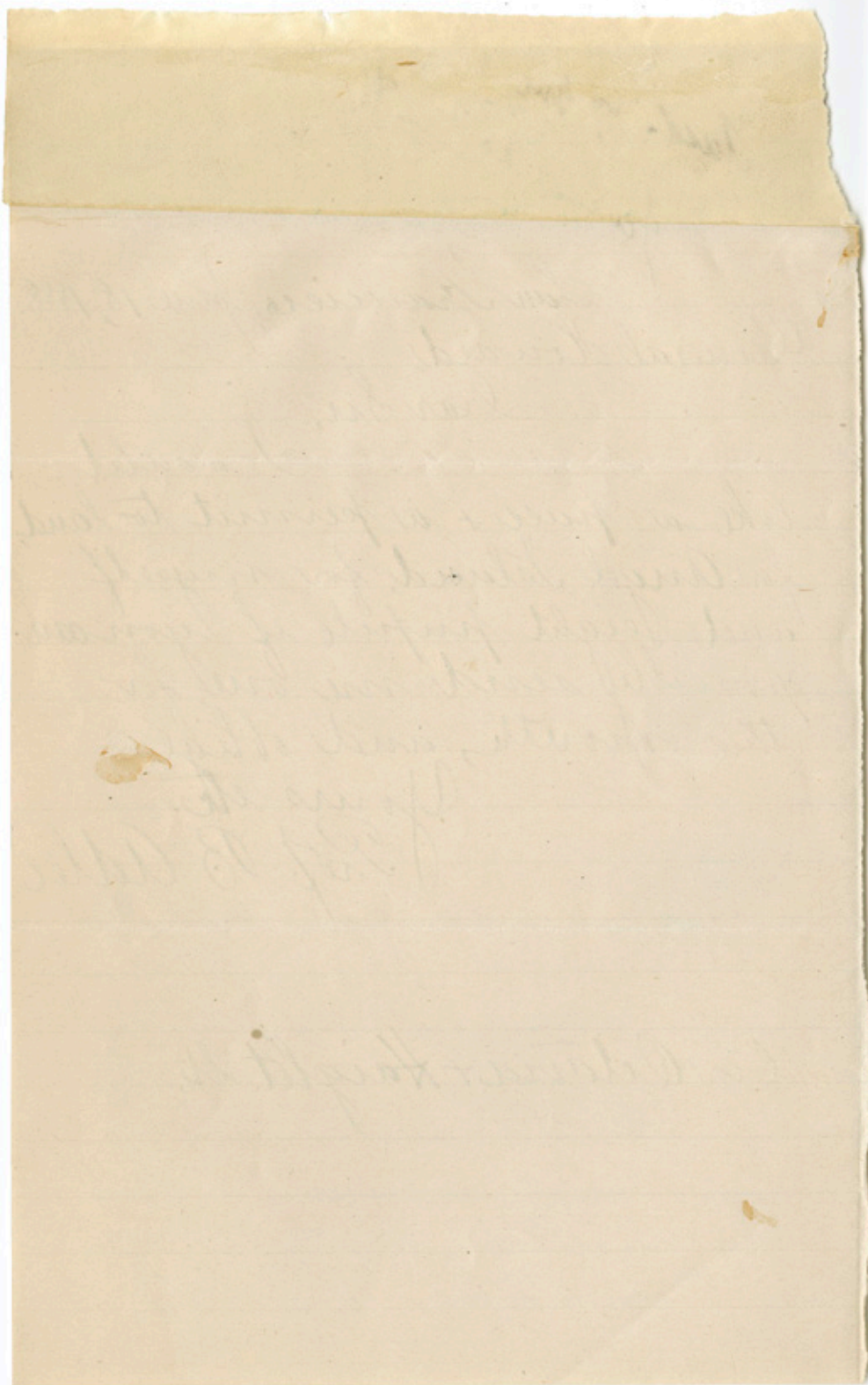

My dear General:

I have been on leave for a week, up on Puget Sound, and when I got back I found your kind letter of the 8th inst. here. I thank you sincerely for its contents, and I shall probably be able to leave here early in July, say the 5th, 6th or 7th.

The anticipated has occurred. My promotion has come, and that just at a time when I should have been glad to have had it deferred for a few months. But a telegram from Washington says Capt. Omentin

"is retired, to date June 15". So I shall, in all probability, get my Commission in the course of the next two or three weeks, and this opportunity to visit you will be the last one of the kind I shall have. I am to be relieved as Gov. Mr. on the 30th and a few days will be necessary to "turn over".

So if you will order me down, and not make it presumptuous that I shall start "at once", I will start as soon as I can get rid of my Gov. Mr.'s responsibilities.

I am sorry it came just now, for I believe I never had such a possibility of getting into the Gov. Dept. before.

As it is, I shall, as soon as I receive
my Commission, ask to be ordered
before the Retiring Board, and turn
my eyes towards Portland, where
business has taken a new start and
everybody seems to have plenty to do.

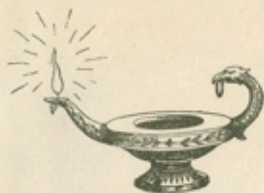
Capt. Gray and Grace were at

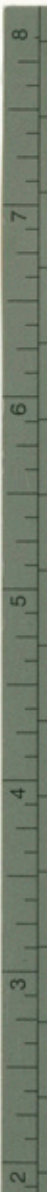
