#### HOURS OF RECITATION.

Three recitations of one hour each—five minutes being allowed for changing of rooms—are appointed each student for every working day. Only those students who are of sufficiently mature age and strength are encouraged to undertake an additional hour. For such facilities for admission to special studies are at hand. The hours of recitation in the courses in Arts and Science are, in general, from 10.30 A.M. until 1.30 P.M., but some recitations occupy a fourth hour. The instruction in the School of Engineering begins at 9 A.M.
