I return thanks for your kind acknowledgment of the little printed company tactics.

I am greatly encouraged to continue my study of the subject, from the favorable comments of Capt Pierce and Lieut Connally of the 1<sup>st</sup> Inf, who have been drilling their men in the movements - those I have printed, contain the principal departures from, or changes in, Upton's Tactics, up to Battalion Manoeuvres: these will be materially changed and simplified -

I have applied for a copy right and will go ahead with the book as rapidly as my duties will permit -

I have been very busy since Col Brisson left; his death seemed very sudden, yet it had been near at hand for two years past, and liable to occur at any time.

I saw General Miles, Gen. Ruggles and Col Brown at Headquarters today. Gen. Miles had

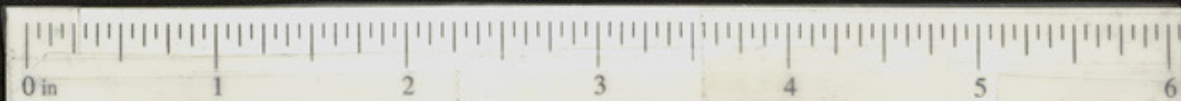


a grand review on the 22<sup>d</sup> at the Presidio, followed by a sort of sham battle, the latter consisted mainly of sundry & divers fusillades of blank cartridges by infantry Arty & Cavalry, Militia and Regulars. I was greatly astonished at observing that the Governor of California, accompanied by General Dimond and his (the Governor's Staff, in part) made the inspection of all the Troops and received the review. General Miles taking a back seat; I have not had an opportunity to inquire why it was done that way, if any one likely to know but it did not seem right or proper to me. I could not help thinking that it failed to maintain the respect due to U. S. Authority.

We are all quite well. I am afraid Fred's bill for retirement as an Ensign did not get through the House - it passed the Senate but did not have time to work through the House.

I hear Lieut Col. J. P. Farley is likely to be assigned to the Command of this Arsenal. That will please me. Farley will be a good Commander.
