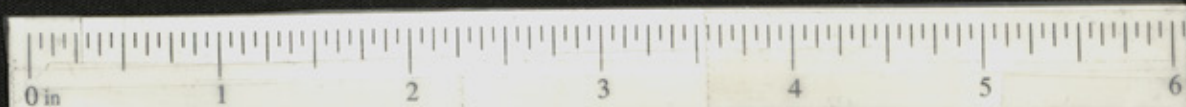
General O. O. Howard:

Island.

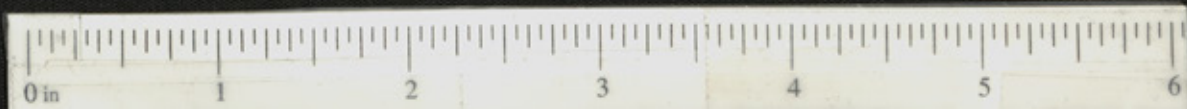
If I may beg of you

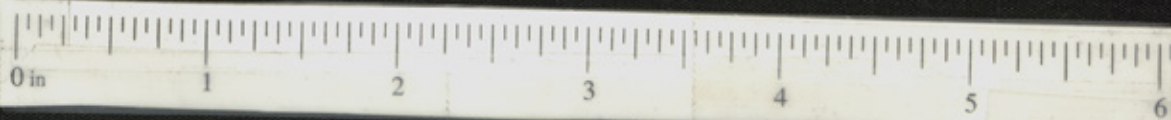

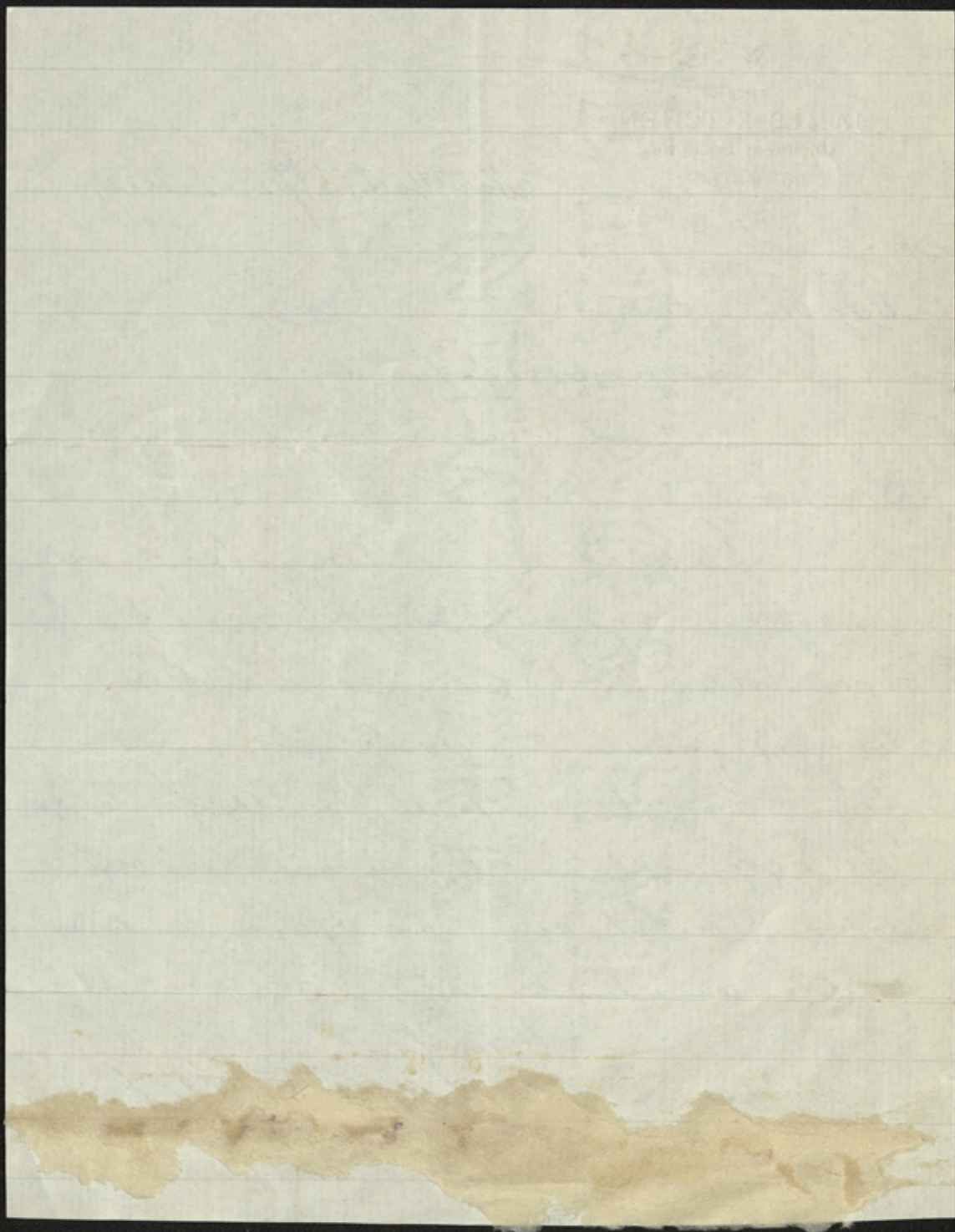

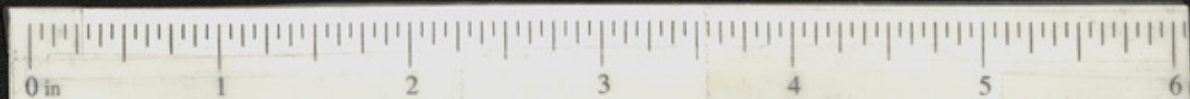

tee on the programme are desirous to make it up as soon as possible.

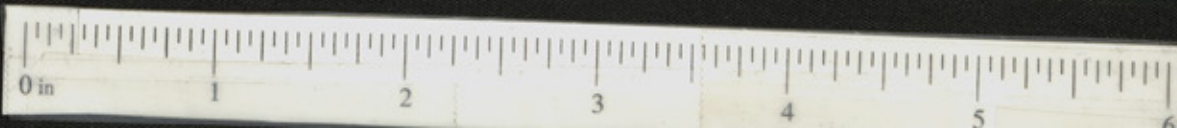
