3. Could those tops be secured in N. Y in quantity, say 25,000 or two or three times that many for shipment here?

What would be the probable cost per thousand to secure such and place them on car for shipment at the earliest time when danger

from frost would be past? Would want the plants to be guaranteed to be the sugar loaf variety as the other or common variety are plenty here.

If you know any one who can give above information reliable you will greatly oblige, or if you know any one who would like to supply such plants arrangements can be made


