

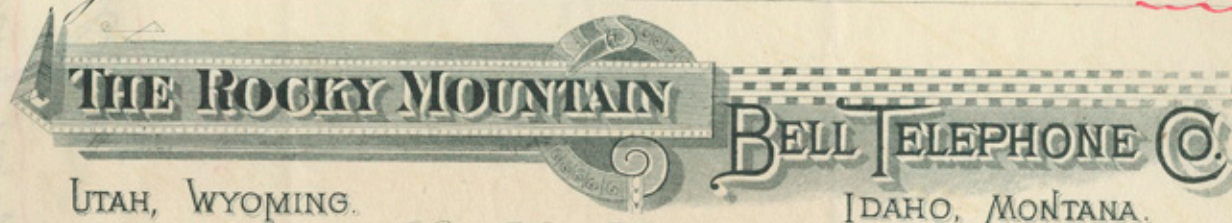

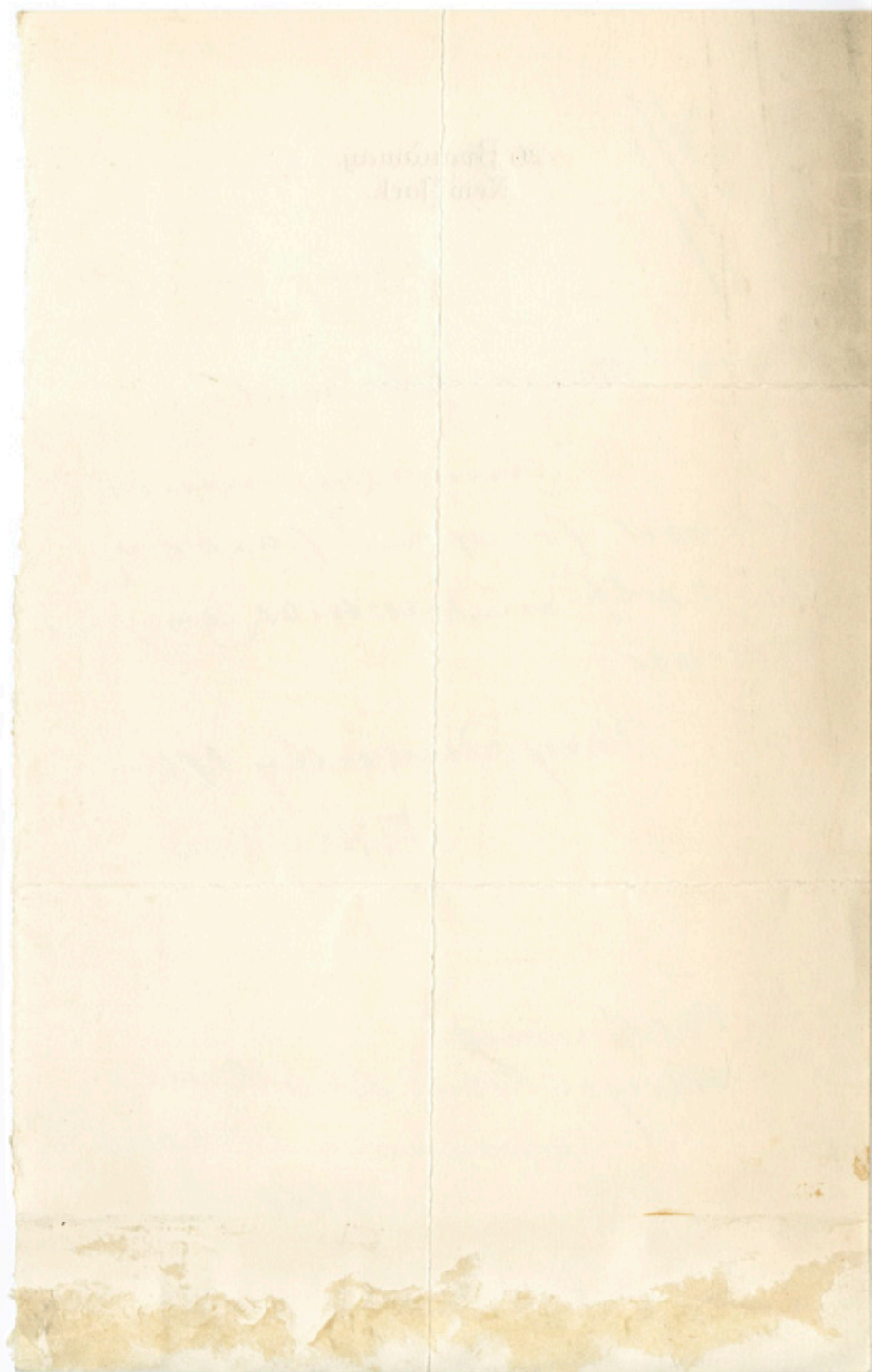

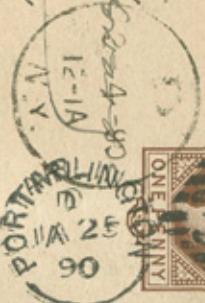

Sir - On Nov 27-89 I delivd at Ft Warren Boston Harbor, deserter Michael J Holman, upon order of Lt Col A. S. Daggett Retg Officer #18 Portland Str, this city, leaving word for my vouchers to be mailed ^{leaving} to me because the entire command was at that time engaged in target practice.

On Dec 4-89 I recd chs for two previous rewards, from W. L. Price and Lt 2nd Arty A. A. G. M. Stationed at Ft Warren but no notice being taken of the Holman Vouchers.

On Dec 9-89 I wrote Lt Price asking if he would kindly mail me said chs. No notice was taken of this note. On Dec 13-89 I delivered Escaped Military Convict Leest Downing at Ft Warren, sending the Serjt Major to notify the Adjt - Lt W. L. Price - that

I had a prisoner to turn over. The
failed to reply. but finally the officer of
the day took the man, & in answer to my
query concerning the Holman vouchers, I was
informed that Lt Pierce had been spoken to
about it & that they ought to have been
forwarded.

On Dec 16-89 I wrote Lt Pierce asking for
the Holman Vouchers as well as the Downing
Vouchers, asking an early reply as I was
liable to be called away for some time.

On the 19th Dec-89 I recd both sets of
Vouchers & immediately returned them duly
signed.

On Dec 30-89 I asked Lt Pierce to kindly
send me the two checks for Holman & Downing
Rewards, receiving in reply Jan 1-90
a ck for the Downing Reward, with this
information & admonition.

"The payment of reward for apprehension
of Michael J Holman, a deserter from the
U.S. Army. Service will be made when funds
for this purpose become available."

"It is unnecessary for you to direct
letters to me requesting the payment of

Deserters turned in at
this post are received for
by the Officer of the Day and
not by the Post Adjutant.

On my next monthly
estimate of funds paid
is entered the amount of
the reward and as soon
as such funds are properly
transferred to me I mail
official checks to the persons
to whom such reward is due.

In this particular instance
the deserter was delivered
some three days after the
monthly estimate had been
forwarded, and consequently
the reward for his arrest
was held over until the
December estimate, Dec. 24, 1889.

The Chief Quartermaster of the
Div. did not allow the reward
on this estimate for reasons
given by him upon invoice
of funds, viz: that it was

not a proper charge against
the Current Expenses of
this Division. I included
this reward in my "List
of Outstanding Debts" for Jan.
1890, and today have received
an invoice of funds covering
it. As for the remarks
within concerning the corre-
spondence I can only say
that Mr. Sampson's letters
have always received as prompt
attention as the business of this
office has allowed. His last
letter was answered on the 25th
inst. and in all cases the in-
formation he has asked for has
been given. He has seemed
to labor under the apprehension
that rewards can be paid at
any time and that funds for the
same are always available.
