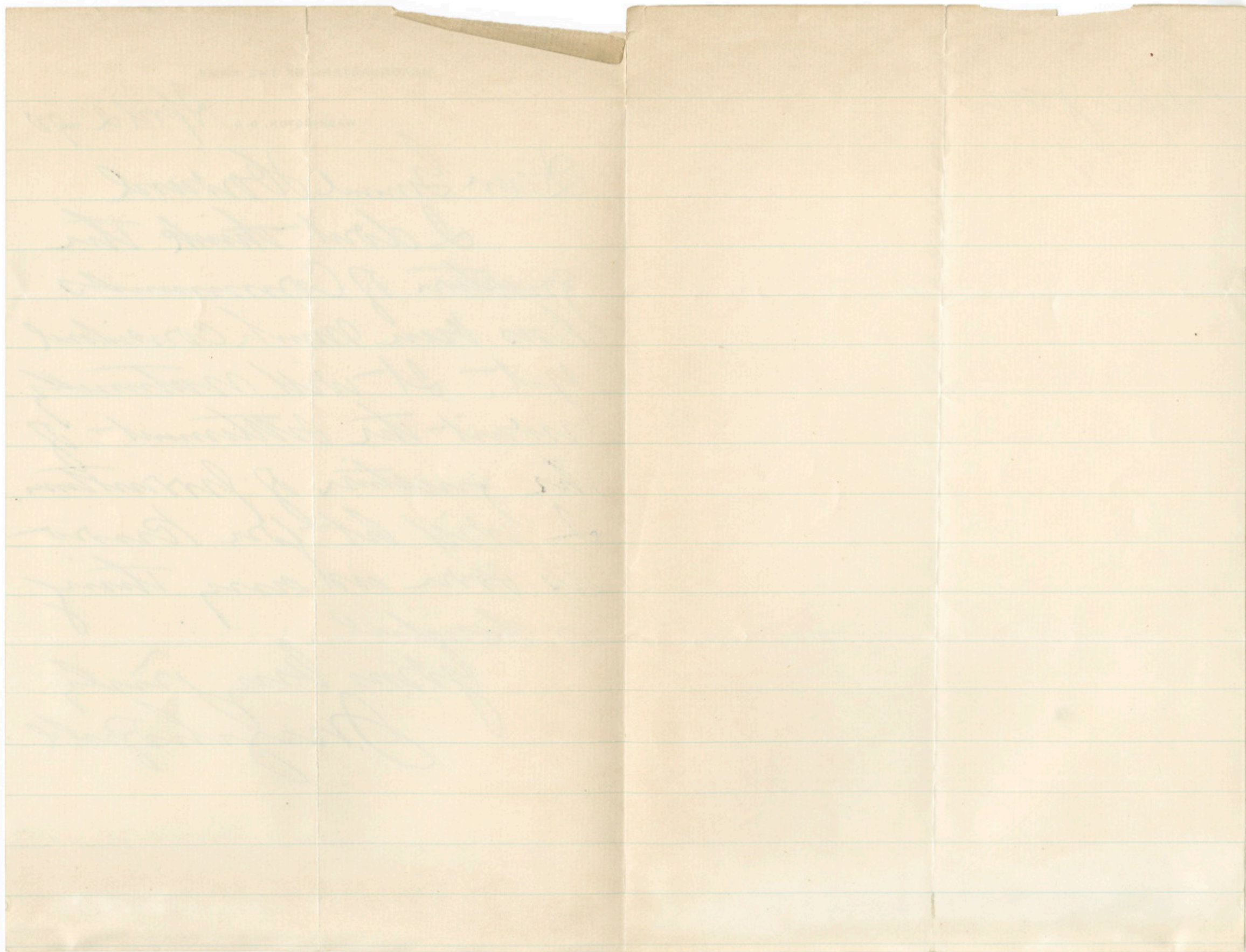

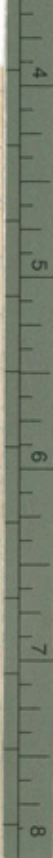
I feel quite blue to-day. I am financially broke down, not enough to pay rent.

You are probably aware that the "Canteen" system for the Army is opposed by temperance people on the ground that wine & beer are sold largely and at a profit. On all other grounds the Canteen system is approved. ^{Hon.} Elijah A. Morse of Mass., at the request of the W. G. T. U., introduced this amendment as part of the appropriation bill for the Army - at the point where \$100,000 is appropriated for "Canteen & other pure purposes"

"Provided, that no alcoholic liquors, including Beer & wine, ^{shall} be sold or supplied to enlisted men (any person) on the premises in any "Canteen" or any room or building at any military post." The Amendment,
