Greene passed through Chicago he told me that when they should notify me where to go they would give me ample time to move. But when the word came it said "go at once to Omaha". As it was my first order from the Company I thought it would be best to obey it literally and so I went home and "packed" night and day (not even stopping to write any letters) and reported here for work yesterday morning early. The last load of household goods was yet to be loaded on the wagon to be taken to the depot when we hurried to the train.

Alice will spend the summer on the farm with her father and mother. I shall try to stay here for a while and depend upon the trains, but expect to stay in the city as soon as work requires it. Tell Jamie that I traded my safe for this type-writer, something for which I have more use. Love to all.





# BATTLE OF ATLANTA

JULY 22ND, 1864.

Photographed from Painting by Jas. E. Taylor, of New York.

The scene shows the 16th Corps, Gen. Grenville M. Dodge, Commanding, repulsing Gen. John B. Hood's desperate assaults in the rear of the Army of Tennessee. On the left of the Picture is shown Gen. Elliot W. Rice's Brigade, File Firing. Maj. Frederick Welker's six Napoleons, and the 14th Ohio's six Parrots, hurling projectiles at the approaching Confederates. Gen. Thomas Sweeney, Commanding 2d Division, and Staff, dismounted, in foreground. Gen. G. M. Dodge, Commanding Corps, is mounted, with Staff, Tichenor, Jonas, Barnes and others, are shown in left, foreground. Col. August Mersey's Brigade is being hurled against Bate's Column emerging from distant wood, while in the right distance Gen. John W. Fuller's Division is checking W. H. T. Walker's Division massed. Fuller has seized the Colors of the 27th Ohio and planted them as a rallying point. Walker is killed and his Division is repulsed.
