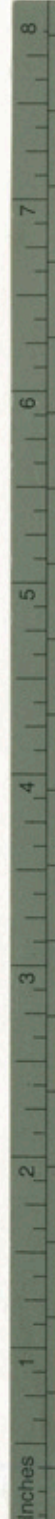
My dear Sir:-
