
I could give you Friday Oct. 31st but you


The Young People of our Church

I trust it will receive your early attention and again thank you, Sir, for the cordial encouragement given in our conversation this afternoon.





Many thanks for your kind letter, which reached me today, enclosing one to the Hon. Secretary of War.


Your letter covers the ground I looked for through you, as it furnishes explicit reference to official documents, from which I could offer no better testimony to the facts set forth.




Your kind letter is at hand



Please accept my
heartfelt thanks for the very
kind letter which you have
written in my behalf to
M^r le pasteur Jean Monnier
of Paris.

The coal region of
St Etienne, Loire, is what
M^r Monnier means by
"bassin houillier". I believe
that I might be very success-
ful and would much prefer
to go there and work up the
field. But, besides the cost
of passage for myself and
family, it would take fully
\$700⁰⁰ for the first year,



especially as I would have
nothing else with which to
buy some furniture.

The (cong) Church of
Spencer (Mass.), would
subscribe the amount necessa-
ry to take us to France but
could do nothing more.

I feel very shy about asking
money for myself. However
I have had to speak of it.
My friends who have money
are few and there are so many
calls upon their purses.

I have written to several per-
sons through whom I thought
that I might obtain a part
of the sum needed, but I
have had no success so far
beyond what some of our
Spencer friends are disposed
of doing. It is Deacon J. L.

Bush, of Spencer, Mass.
who has this matter in charge.

We have wealthy friends in
Spencer, who would not feel
very much the poorer if
they would take the whole mat-
ter in hand. But I think
them very kind if they do
what Dea. Bush says
they will probably do
for us. We have been only
seven months in Spencer
and the people there have given
large sums for the work
among the French Canadians.

If I had enough money
with me (besides ^{that} for the passage)
for the first six months, and
the certitude that my friends
would obtain the balance
during that time for the
remaining six months,



Dear Sir:-

This liberty of address-
ing you I take hoping that
you will be interested in
the building of a Methodist
Episcopal Church at

Barnegat Park. I have had
a preliminary talk with Lieut.
-the Superintendent at the Park.

The Company will give the
ground and we propose to
build a church costing about
\$6000 when ready for use; a
more expensive one, if it is
thought best by the parties
interested to do so. This will
be a frame structure with
modern comforts and



seating over 500 when thrown
into one room; a design 
recommended by the Church
Extension Society. While the
property will be held for
the M. E. Church, subject to
our disciplinary rules, a clause
will be inserted granting the
use of the church for religious
services by any evangelical
denominations for five (5) years;
our services taking precedence.


I am sure it would be a
great assistance to us in the
work if we might let it be
known that Gen. Howard is
favorable to the project and
if, at the proper time, you
will consent to act as one of
the trustees of the property.

Perhaps you will kindly
permit me to speak with you

about the matter when you
visit the "Park". Excuse me

saying that I had the more
confidence in addressing you
as I had the more respect, if
possible, for you after hearing
one gentleman, not a Christian,
say, "Yes, if we had a church
here General Howard would



My dear General

In the course of a week or two days Maj. Huntz will have completed, closed up and shipped the records and property of Co 'K'. He is transferred to Co 'D' now at Atlanta Ga. by a War Dept order and ordered to join his company. He is commanding here the 16 men of 'K' that were transferred by your order to 'D' Co. Lt Casey of the 15th now here, is sick and unable to do anything, and will be so for some time to come as he has got on in inflammatory rheumatism.

If Maj. Huntz goes to Atlanta it leaves me with only the two officers of my own battery for duty, and I can have no Courts, except by having a foreigner officer ordered here, and that, just at a period of payment, when a Court is





a disaduation, and the knowledge that can be called if necessary, is somewhat of a check on bad behavior among men.

It appears to me it would be judicious to keep Maj Henty here with this portion of his company. - The weather is very comfortable here now, and I think it would be well for 'D' of the 15th if it could be brought together under its Captain, and assimilation and reorganization begun as soon as possible. - Men men are needed at this post also;

I write you thus because when H.D. Des. of the Army ordered Maj Henty to join his company, it ^{probably} did not occur to them that he was present with a large fraction of it at this post. - Hoping you will be able to arrange that I may retain Maj Henty, and that the rest of his company may soon be ordered here, I remain






do so.


