THIS Committee was organized in New York City, January 5, 1887, and has for its object the employment of Evangelists and securing them for pastors and churches needing such service. During the past two years Mr. J. W. DEAN, of Chicago, has been employed by the Committee holding union meetings from ten to twenty days each, in different towns in the State, among which were the following:

Watertown, Waterford, Cohoes, Troy, Brookfield, East Syracuse, Union Centre, Lenox Basin, Conewango, Amsterdam, Lowville, Carthage and other places.

The uniform testimony of pastors is, that a great blessing attends these efforts, in the building up of believers, and the salvation of souls.

While in a few places more has been contributed, and in others less than the amount needed to support the Evangelists, the aggregate has been nearly enough to meet the expenses, with a very slight outlay on the part of the Committee.

The results have been so satisfactory that the Committee feel encouraged to continue the work.

The following rules are submitted for the guidance of the work:

(1) It is expected that the meetings will be *Union Services* and held on invitation of the pastors.

(2) That entertainment be provided for the Evangelist.

(3) While no fixed sum is stipulated, it is *expected* that at each place an opportunity will be given for the people to make a free-will offering to the Evangelist.

(4) The many calls for this kind of service make it desirable that the Evangelist should not remain over ten days or two weeks in one place, but this rule may be changed by circumstances.

Those desiring further information in regard to securing Evangelistic help, should communicate with either the Chairman, Mr. D. W. McWILLIAMS, the Secretary, Mr. E. W. HAWLEY, or any member of the Committee.



I have conferred with a friend of mine in the real estate business who is fully in sympathy with such institutions as Camp Church. & he investigated the matter with some care.
