Dear General Howard:

You very kind gen-
-erous letter received. I have no transcript
of Sandy's record, but I have written to two
Pension lawyers in Washington, who perhaps
can get one. As soon as possible I shall
get a certificate from a board of
physicians at the Pension Office in
San Francisco. I am anxious to prove
that I would not ask for assistance
from the Government, were I not seriously
an invalid. I have now a cough that
harasses me by night and day, making
me very nervous. I am thin, and am
endeavoring to make an arrangement
to spend the winter at Walnut Creek
ten miles from this place, further in
the mountains. Mr Lee, the Episcopal
clergyman and his wife have been

very kind. They have a friend in Walnut Creek, who can assist me in raising a class of pupils there.

Although Genl. Mc Cook made the acquaintance of his present wife at my house, while she was making a three months visit with me, and although I considered him to be of all men, truly my friend, and Sandy's friend, he has not, to my great surprise, written one word to me since my husband's death, in all my trouble and sorrow. It was reported through the regiment at the time of Capt. Murdock's death that Genl. McCook felt slightly conscience-stricken from having especially ordered Capt. Murdock into camp in Southern Utah, to avoid being taking him to Heavenworth. There was so much gossip upon the subject at the time, that both Sandy and I felt that we ought to feel slighted. After she was married Mrs. McCook seemed to resent the fact of her being under an obligation to me, and

she has become estranged from me, and has
not been the friend that I have always been to
her. Especially since I have been ill, I
know that they feel very much disturbed
about me. I hardly know how to approach
Genl. McCook upon the subject of having my
pension increased. Since my sister has ac-
tually died of consumption, Annie McCook
has allowed a letter of mine to remain un-
answered. But I will try to reach them
indirectly. I paid \$3000 for the house of
14 rooms and 20 acres of land, half meadow,
half woodland, in Monterey, 9 miles from
Great Barrington, 14 from Lenox, in Berkshire
Co. Mass. The house is of brick, cream-
colored, and is in good repair. I had a
back-room put in at an expense of \$500
with drains, and new sinks; plastering done,
papering and painting. Had a chicken house
built, and altogether spent about \$1000 in
renovating, but property has so deteriorated
in value, that I cannot sell the place

at all. There are two mortgages, one for a thousand dollars (\$1000) another for \$300. It is a very hopeless affair. There is a good barn, and an ice-house, and immense pine trees around the house. Really it is very refined looking and romantic, and it is rented to Mr. Claff for \$100 a year, \$60 of which pays the interest on the first mortgage, and the interest on the second mortgage is compounding at 10%. Every day I expect news of a foreclosure. It is leased for two years from last April. The taxes and insurance are kept up, I believe. out of the rent. Thank you very much for your kindness, and sympathy. I have some quite influential friends in Milwaukee, who may be of assistance to me in getting the premium increased. One,

Dear Sir:

Inclosed I hand you communication from Col. Wm. C. Church, which will explain why I address you.

We are to have a Southern Exposition in this City, commencing the first day of October and ending the first day of December. We would like very much to have a detachment of artillery and a regimental band stationed on our Exposition grounds during the months of October and November, to be able to fire salutes in honor of the opening of the Exposition, and on the occasion of visits from prominent gentlemen throughout the United States.

President Harrison is expected to be present; Postmaster General, Wanamaker, has agreed to be present and deliver an address, also, the Secretary of Agriculture, Hon. J. Rusk, the Commissioner of Fishery, Col. McDonald, the Commissioner of Education, Harris, and a number of other prominent gentlemen officially connected with the United States' Government.

We would like very much to have a visit from yourself and will try to make it pleasant and agreeable for you while here.

A request has been made to the Secretary of War, through Hon. Jno. Nichols, one of the Chiefs of the Treasury Department, and the Governor of this State has also written to the Secretary of War urging him to comply with our request. I assure you that the people of this section will be under many obligations to you for any favors you can render in this matter. We are to have, during the Exposition, a grand re-union of the "Blue and the Grey". A Committee has been appointed by the Northern Settlers of this State and also one on the part of the men who served in the late war on the Confederate side, to take up the matter of appropriations for


