

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

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

We are prosecuting an Indian Depredation claim for Delia G. Webber, widow of Louis Webber deceased, and write to ask if you are acquainted with any of the facts relating thereto.

The circumstances out of which said claim arose were as follows:

Louis Webber was employed by the Government as a packer during the time of the Modoc War of 1872-73. April 29, 1873 at the time of the death of Gen. Canby, Webber and other men were ordered by the Commander of the Fourth Artillery to bring into camp the bodies of Gen. Canby and Dr. Thomas. While engaged in this duty all were attacked by Indians and Webber was killed and robbed of all his effects with him at the time. It is stated that he lost a valuable watch and money in about the sum of \$1800. The truth of this

The case has been the subject of favorable Congressional action, but the recent Indian Depredation Act has transferred jurisdiction of such matters to the Court of Claims at Washington where this case is now being prosecuted in behalf of Mrs. Webber. Congressmen Luttrell and Rosecrans both advocated bills in Congress for Mrs. Webber.

We now write to ask if you remember any of the circumstances connected with the death of Webber, and if so, if you will not kindly make us a statement of all facts within your memory. We would particularly like to know, if you remember, the capacity in which Louis Webber was acting at that time, whether as a soldier of the United States or not, the value and the nature of the property lost by him, and the date and circumstances of his death as you remember them. This is a most meritorious case, and the widow and children of Louis Webber are now in very reduced circumstances. Your compliance with the above requests will confer an undoubted favor upon them. If you can furnish us with the names and addresses of any who are familiar with the facts relating to this case please do so.
