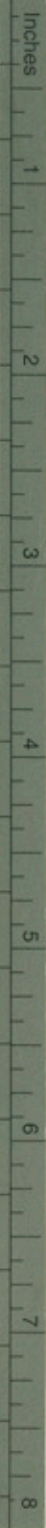

My dear General:-

I am sorry that I did not see you, and that I missed the visit of Captain Barnett. I think it is perhaps best that I should give up my trip to Mexico entirely. I have so many duties that conflict that perhaps I should abandon it without further thought. One of my difficulties relates to the car which we were to use. Our roads unfortunately terminate at Washington, where the officers of the government ask for our cars without reference to our own wants. 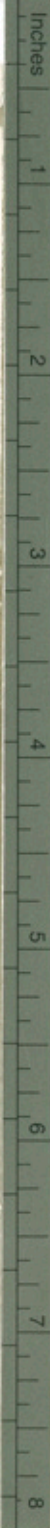

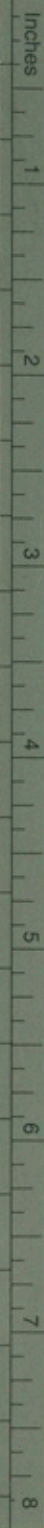

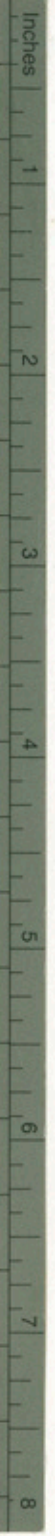
