




I have no right to ask you for any personal favor, and I would not write you in relation to the subject of this letter if it were not that I know your great interest in everything that concerns boys and young men, and furthermore if I were not myself similarly interested.

We have organized a boys' company of Missionary Cadets in Montclair, and I can report that thus far the enterprise is very successful.
