My dear General:-

I have no right to ask you for any personal favor, and I would not write you in relation to the subject of this letter if it were not that I know your great interest in everything that concerns boys and young men, and furthermore if I were not myself similarly interested.

We have organized a boys' company of Missionary Cadets in Montclair, and I can report that thus far the enterprise is very successful. We are about to have some entertainments for the benefit of the boys and I have agreed to give a talk on the Battle of Gettysburgh. I have been over the field quite carefully and have made something of a study of the battle. I can only tell the story in a very plain simple manner, but intend to do the best I can. What I most need are two maps, one showing the country from Chancellorsville, or at least Culpeper, Va., to Philadelphia, Harrisburg and Carlisle, Penn., and another map showing the entire battlefield and the location of the various parts of the two armies on each day of the battle. I write to inquire if you can tell me where these maps can be had. I can have them made by the boys themselves, but undoubtedly there are maps in existence which would be quite superior to anything that the boys could produce. If you could also tell me where I could find what you consider the fullest and most accurate account of the entire battle I should be greatly obliged.

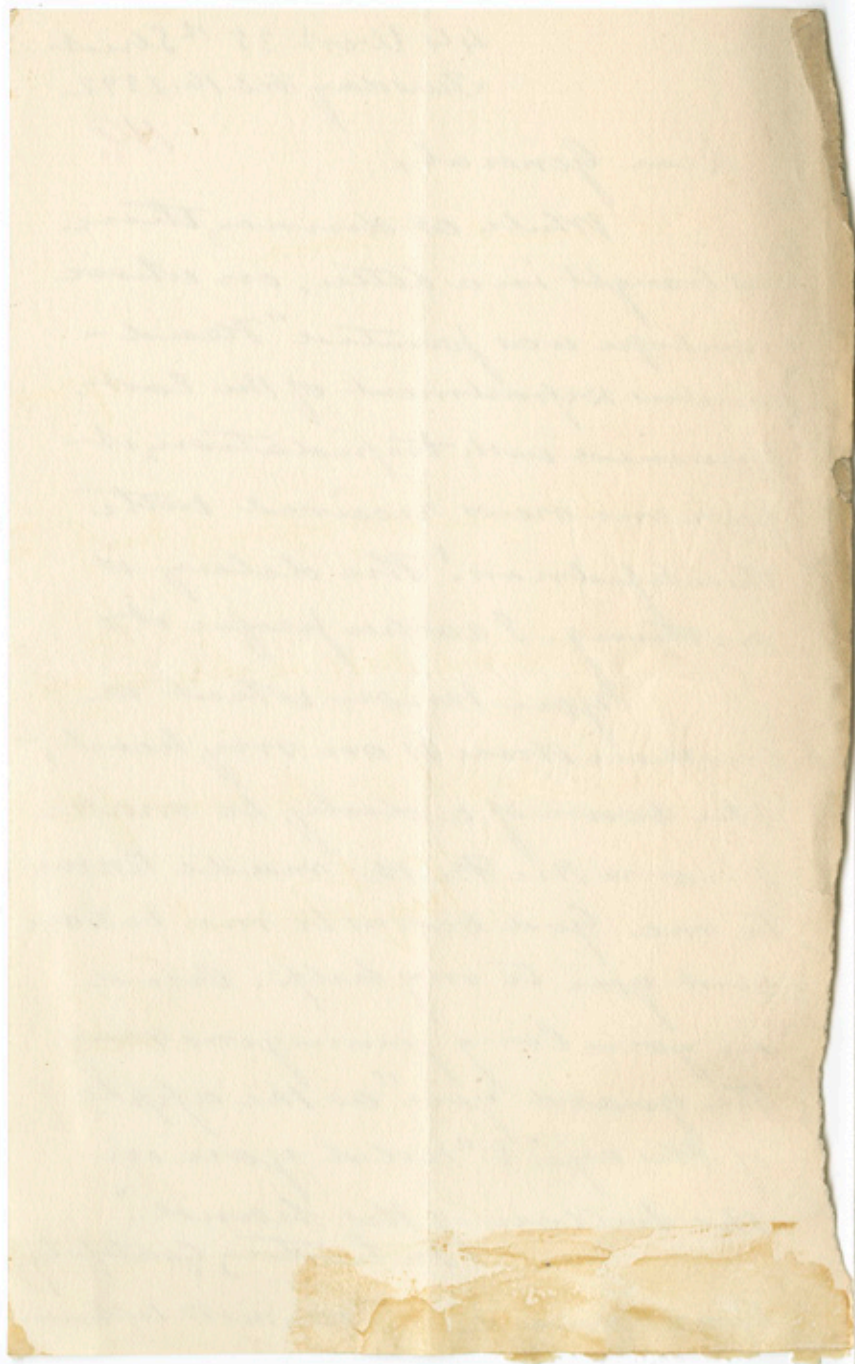

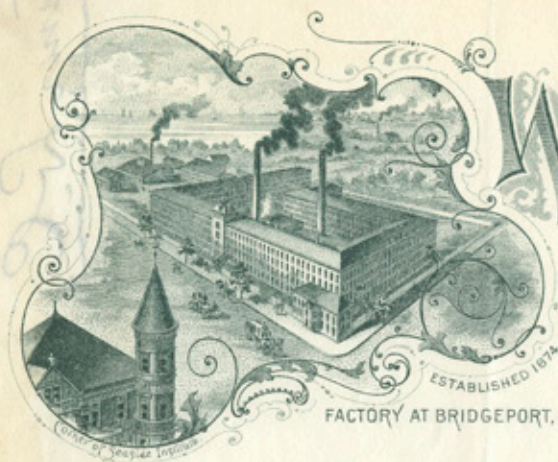
