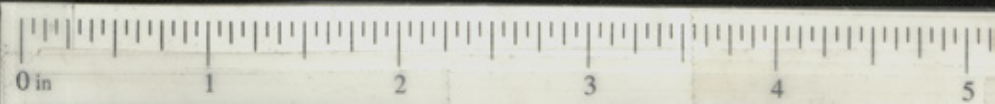
I am extremely thankful to you for your action and very kind letter.

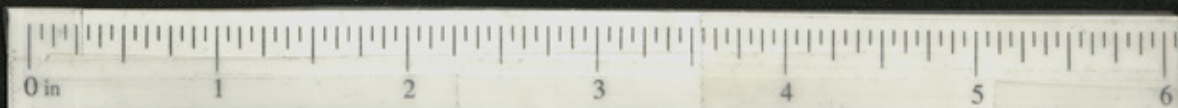

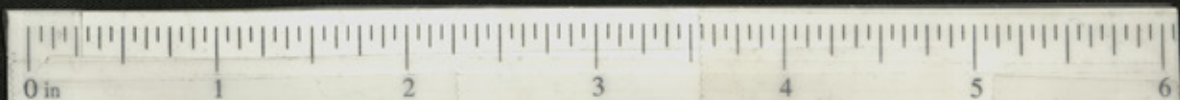
