





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The Society has fourteen lecturers in the field, all of whom are commissioned after careful tests have proved them worthy of confidence, and capable of good service, and some of whom will respond to calls for Temperance and Christian work, at any point, whenever, called through the Secretary Dr. Church, relying on collections for their compensation. Over 500 lectures have been given; 1,200,000 pages of earnest truth printed, put in the hands of the people. Our workers have done their full share in organizing and educating the State for Constitutional prohibition, and all are moved with indignation that the legislature should humbug us with a promise of an election, and balk us in the event, and say we bate not one tittle of our conviction that the prohibitory amendment should be submitted to a vote, and we hereby renew our demand that the legislature shall submit the amendment to the voters, as the Constitution says "it is their duty to do" and the Attorney General says they "can legally and properly provide for," The Society protested by emphatic resolution against opening the Columbian Fair to Sabbath desecration, and the sale of intoxicating beverages on its grounds.

Also urging the Senate of the U.S. to ratify the compact of the 17 nations of Europe for the suppression of the slave, opium and liquor traffic in Central Africa.

The meager and uncertain support given, the reluctance of fashionable and wealthy people to co-operate in any form of temperance work, and the jealousy of politicians lest anything be done in favor of prohibition make all our way up hill and discouraging; very much like the crosses and hardships endured when everybody was down on abolition forty years ago. The sacrifices and heroism by noble souls in battling for the right is as marked as in apostolic times. The runseller rules with a rod of iron. The great majority accept his domination and do his bidding.

No cause or organization has a better claim to your confidence and co-operation.

Working for the public weal with unselfish devotion we have a right to ask you to open the way for our lecturers, show them a Christian hospitality when with you, and contribute to their support and usefulness. The enormous sums spent for liquors, (1,-200,000.00 for 1890) make all done to advance temperance seem very small. Will you grudge us that ?

We could greatly enlarge our operations and influence with more means. We invoke such unity and courage in action that we may double the work of last year, and see the temperance cause stand side by side with Church, School, and family, in your esteem and support. Till then "the wicked rule and the people mourn."

Proncon. J.H. REMARKS.

The object of this Society is expressed in Article II of the Constitution: "It shall be the object of this Society to advance the Temperance Reform through the use of moral, religious, educational, social and political agencies—that the young may be instructed, the church be inspired, and the commonwealth be aroused to hasten the time when Total Abstinence and Prohibition shall triumph. And this Society will co operate with all who work to secure a Constitutional amendment prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage."

The Society has been endorsed by Methodist Conferences, Baptist Association, Presbyterian Synods and other ecclesiastical bodies. The prominent Temperance organizations of the State have expressed their confidence in it, and their willingness to unite with it in the work.

It affords an open channel through which all temperance organizations may operate, and proffers its co operation with any and all such organizations as are designed to encouaage temperance and and suppress the liquor traffic. It employs State Lectures, men of acknowledged ability and sound judgment, whom the Executive Committee can endorse, and for whom they bespeak a hearty sympathy and support, and seeks to enlist pastors, educators and reformers to aid in the work, and set in operation as many other agencies and appliances to advance the temperance cause as their funds will allow.

An immense amount of general temperance work is called for in our state, such as is the province of this Society to engage in, and which demands the co-operation of all who would see the curse of drunkenness removed from homes and society.

We invite every one interested to organize some effective work in their own locality, pastors, teachers and others to preach and lecture, and to push the temperance cause by every available means, and "report any special interest or work to us for the encouragement of others, and also to give our Society the benefit of a collection at some church service, temperance or social gathering. If you belong to no temperance body send us your own name with \$1.00 for an annual, or \$10.00 for a life membership, and to this extent encourage and help our Society in its work, and thus identify yourself with reform.
