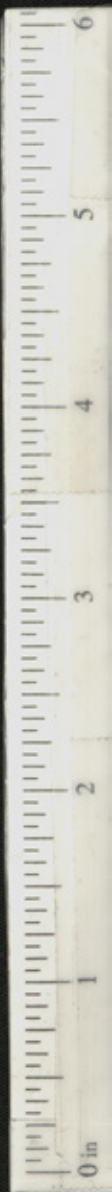

The note of your Mr. Treat

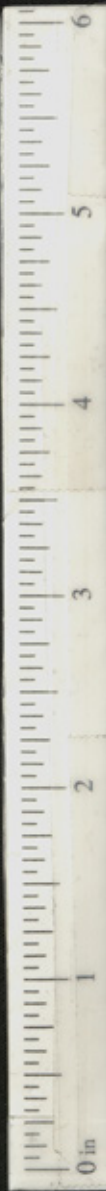

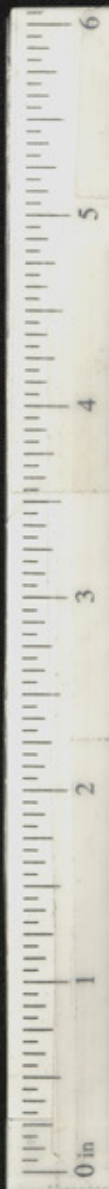

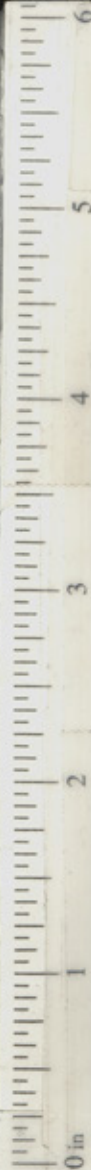

now in my library.

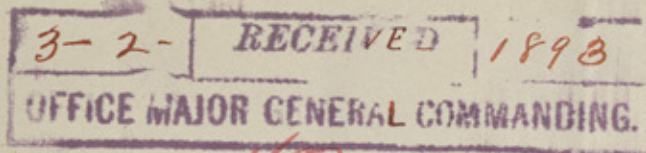
You are doubtless aware that the scene
