

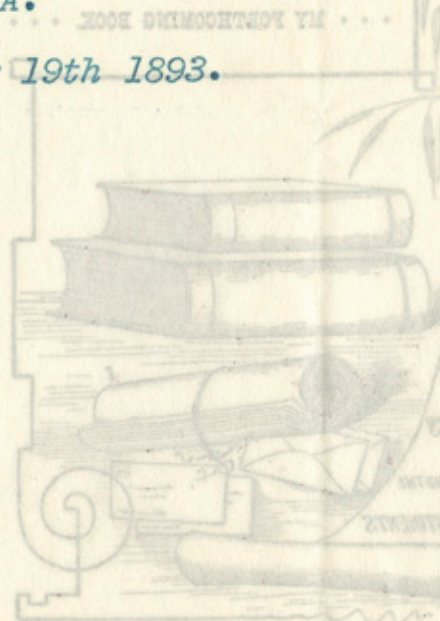

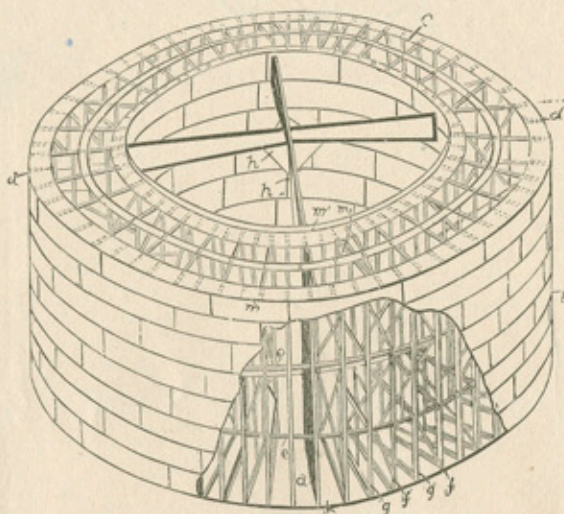

Dear Brother:--

Your kind letter of Sept. 18th. is received. No doubt you have talked over the matter of the College with Burt long before this will reach you. I agree with you, that probably the College of N.Y. is the right one. Burt will look up the courses and see where ~~where~~ best he would fit in. If I remember correctly, this was formerly known as the New York Free Academy, and among its honored graduates was my dear friend A.P. Ketchum. Judging by him, I should conclude that it was a good institution. However, "it takes more than one swallow to make a summer", and perhaps you and Burt had better see what the present condition of the college is before concluding. It may be on careful examination that Burt will find that the University of New York the more desirable of the three, but I am not certain of paying the tuition there by advertising or that we can get a scholarship. One good years study at the College of New York will do Burt an immense amount of good, and then he can go on to graduate there or at Dartmouth or the Northwestern as we may then find it practicable. I am in hopes the hard times will let up, and I would be able to pay his bills elsewhere as desirable.

Now as to the book manuscript: McClurg & Co. say they will

have it examined as soon as possible. The matter of the illustrations can be decided afterwards, but I would be glad for more definite instructions in reference to the large number you sent. Did you retain a list of them, and can you give me your preference. I think you only named three or four out of perhaps a couple of dozen or more sent. Second: Did you write out a title page? I did not find it. Perhaps you had better do so, putting it as you desire.

In carefully examining the manuscript there is one seeming deficiency, though perhaps that is rather a strong word; I refer to the want of literary allusion and quotation. It would give a finish to the work if you could have introduced even a very few, and I had almost come to the point of suggesting that we ask Mac to find some poetic selections either as mottoes to the chapters, or in some way illustrative of the text.
