Before a General Court Martial which convened at Fort Thomas, Ky., pursuant to paragraph 2, Special Orders No. 183, August 22nd 1893, Headquarters Department of the East and of which Captain Jeremiah Shindel, 6th Infantry is president and 2nd Lieut. Palmer E. Pierce, 6th Infantry is judge advocate, was arraigned and tried:

Private GUSTAV EML KASELOWSKY,
Band 6th Infantry.

CHARGE I. Deserion in violation of the 47th Article of War.

SPECIFICATION: That he, Private Gustav Emil Kaselowsky, Band 6th Infantry, having been duly enlisted as a soldier in the service of the United States, August 20th 1889, did desert the same at Fort Thomas Ky., on or about October 16th 1891 and did remain absent in desertion until he surrendered himself at Fort Thomas Ky., on or about August 21st 1893.

CHARGE II. Violation of the 17th Article of War.

SPECIFICATION. That he, Private Gustav Emil Kaselowsky Band 6th Infantry, did carry with him in desertion, through neglect lose, or otherwise improperly dispose of the following of Government and Regimental property, which had been issued to him for use in the service: Two (2-) Bed-sheets, money value 64 cents.; two (2) pillow cases, money value 22 cents; two pairs drum sticks, money value \$ 6.50; total money value \$ 7.36. This on or about October 16th 1891, at Fort Thomas Kentucky.
