



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

Dear Sir:

I beg you my dear sir, not to read this letter until you have time, as I sincerely hope it will receive a favorable answer if you have time to think the matter over!

I write in the interest of the National Christian League for the Promotion of Social Purity.

I have guaranteed the rent of Concert Hall and Assembly Rooms in Madison Square Garden, for the week in February commencing on the 19th and continuing through the evening of the 24th, in which to hold a Fair. This is only a means to the end to raise money to press forward our general work, and to establish an Industrial Home for girls and women where they can be trained for domestic work, in the trades, and various other business for which they are best fitted to serve.

I should greatly prefer to go with two or three pious women into my own room and ask the Lord for the necessary funds, if I did not feel that we must use the means at our disposal; some of us have that which we can contribute to a Fair, and the demands made upon the Christian League by unfortunate women and girls, and strictly chaste girls who cannot get work this Winter is so great, that we feel the only means to preserve them from perishing morally, is to be furnished with employment.

I have sent many from one Mission to another; from one Home for fallen girls to another, and various Charitable Institutions, but there is no place for chaste young girls who have no money!

The Charity Organization renders good service in investigating cases, but it gives no employment to any one comparatively. I have sent girls and women back and forth to places where they give out some work, and they are sent to the Charity Organization to get tickets, only to be told by the Charity Organization that they have no tickets. Then when I investigate the matter, am told they had a special number of twenty, and these for preferred cases!

What is to become of these poor creatures with no food, no shelter, and no way to get work?

The Delancy Street Office furnishes from forty to sixty women with work at fifty cents per day, but what of the twenty to sixty thousand who can get no work!





K. Warren. At any rate, Mr. Frame informs us that you are the present owner of the note. He says that they cannot pay this note at it maturity; but he offers, in consideration of an extension, to secure it by a mortgage on about forty lots in McMinnville, Oregon, said to be worth \$100.00 per lot, even in these times of shrunken values. We have no knowledge as to whether or not this valuation is correct.

We advised Mr. Frame that three courses were open to him. To pay the note at maturity.

He asked us, in this connection, to write you as to the condition of money matters out here, probably believing that you might accept our statements more readily than those of a stranger.

It is a melancholy fact that, in addition to the general prostration and financial stringency, this section is especially afflicted in the loss of crops in Eastern Oregon and Washington. It is hardly an exaggeration - not a great one, at any rate, - to say that nobody is paying his debts here, and that no creditor is expecting payment. Most of the banks which closed their doors last year are still closed. There is no money here; and if you were to send the note to us for collection against Frame & Stowell, we would be at a loss to make it for you in money, - because, under our law, if you were to sue them and attach any property that might be found belonging to them, they could dissolve the attachment by making a general assignment for the benefit of all their creditors; and this they declare they will do, and of course it would be their best policy under the circumstances. The result would be that you would get a pro rata interest with the other creditors in the assets, which in this case consist of unimproved lands, for which there is absolutely no sale whatever.

Our advice to you would be to take the security offered, or such security as you can get, for an extension of time on the note. This is the way we have been settling all claims sent to us from the East for collection here. Very truly yours.


