Sir,

I received your note of October
9th and regret that my time has
been so occupied that I have
been unable to relate to you
more promptly some reflections
that it occasions in regard to
you personally.

You admit that you made
the remarks about me that
were attributed to you in the
newspaper article I sent you
and you add that - "of course,
you would not willingly hurt
me or my reputation" - As a
matter of fact that is just
what you did, and I fail to
see wherein it follows "of course"

that you did not do so "willingly";

You also say that my action "provoked the feelings of more than a half million of people and made them feel unkindly toward me and toward regular officers whom so many fancy that I represent".

I decline to accept your statement in regard to that matter. It is, in my opinion, only another expression of those "extreme" views that seem to have become habitual with you.

But as you were so prompt and extreme in your judgment and expression of me, permit me to remind you that no Army officer to my knowledge has been the subject of so much adverse criticism during my period of service, as yourself and, strangely enough, very much of that criticism has

been of the identical characteristics you so promptly applied to me.

Moreover, more than twenty times the half million people you quote to me have been your unfavorable critics in two hemispheres, and I believe that a large proportion of them are so today.

Strangely enough, too, I have been one of the few who defended you among my acquaintances in the Army and out of it, whenever and wherever I heard your conduct and motives challenged. One of the most earnest controversies I have ever had during my Army life was in defending you against the aspersions, as I then believed, of a brother officer, and, by reason of it - then has existed an estrangement - must believe us to this day.

EXTRACTS FROM THE CONSTITUTION.

II. *BASIS*.—The basis of this American Sabbath Union is the Divine authority and universal and perpetual obligation of the Sabbath, as manifested in the order and constitution of nature, declared in the revealed will of God, formulated in the Fourth Commandment of the Moral Law, interpreted and applied by our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, transferred to the Christian Sabbath, or Lord's Day, by Christ and his Apostles, and approved by its beneficent influence upon personal and national life.

III. *OBJECT*.—The object of the American Sabbath Union is to preserve the Christian Sabbath as a day of rest and worship; and for that purpose to secure the formation of co-operative Sabbath Associations in all the States and Territories of our Country; to encourage and aid those Associations already organized that accept the basis of this Union, as expressed in Article 2; to publish documents; to use the public press; to cause addresses to be made; and to employ such other means as shall be expedient and proper.

This Union shall add its endeavors, to those employed by co-operating Sabbath Associations, for circulating Sabbath literature throughout the United States and their Territories, and shall furnish them with stereotype plates, or such other assistance as circumstances may require. All Sabbath Associations shall be allowed to purchase, at cost from this Society, Sabbath documents for distribution within their districts.
