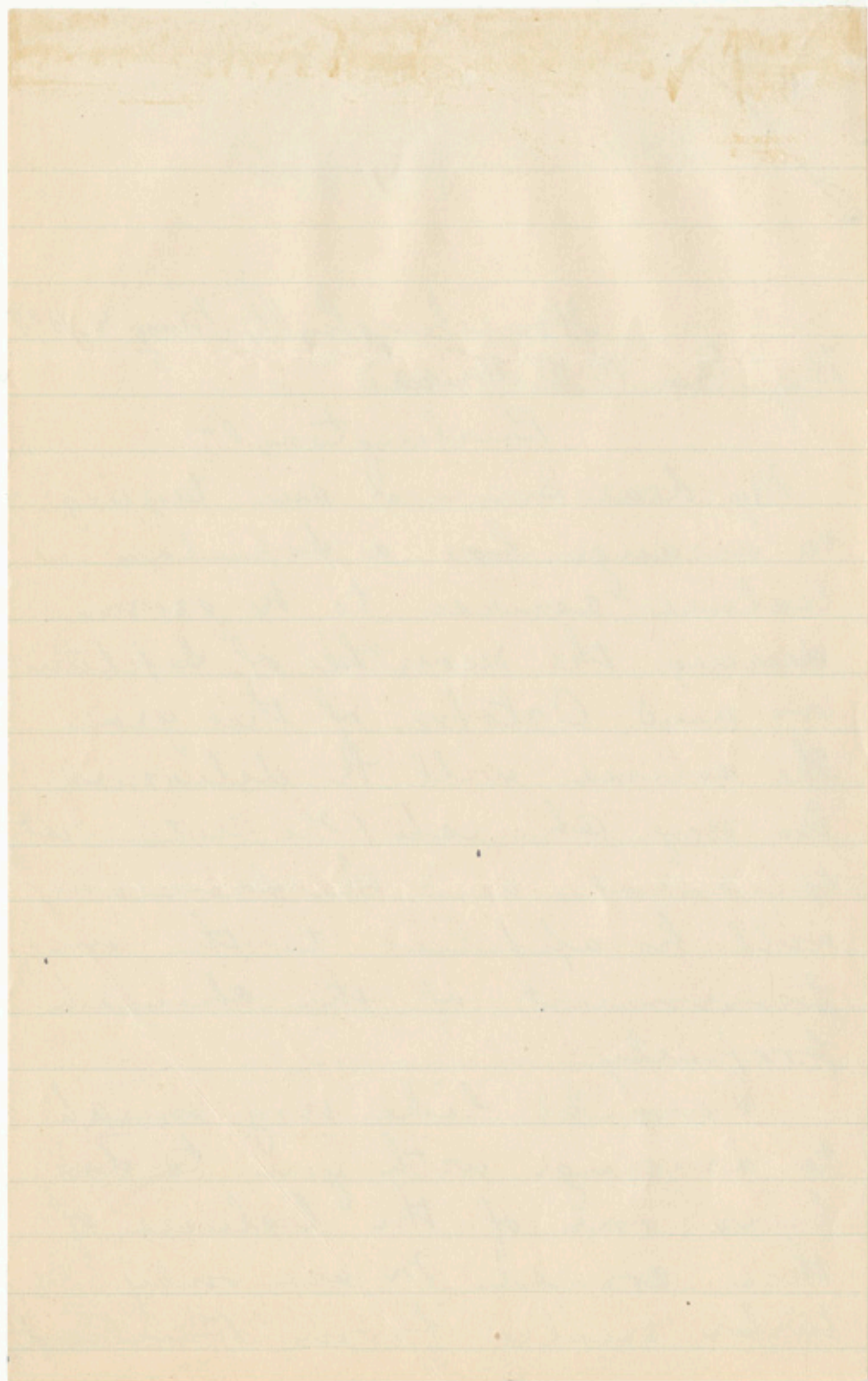

The roads are good; and our people will be very glad to hear you.

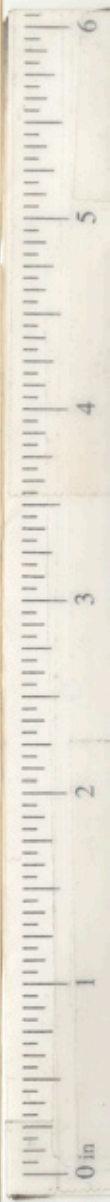
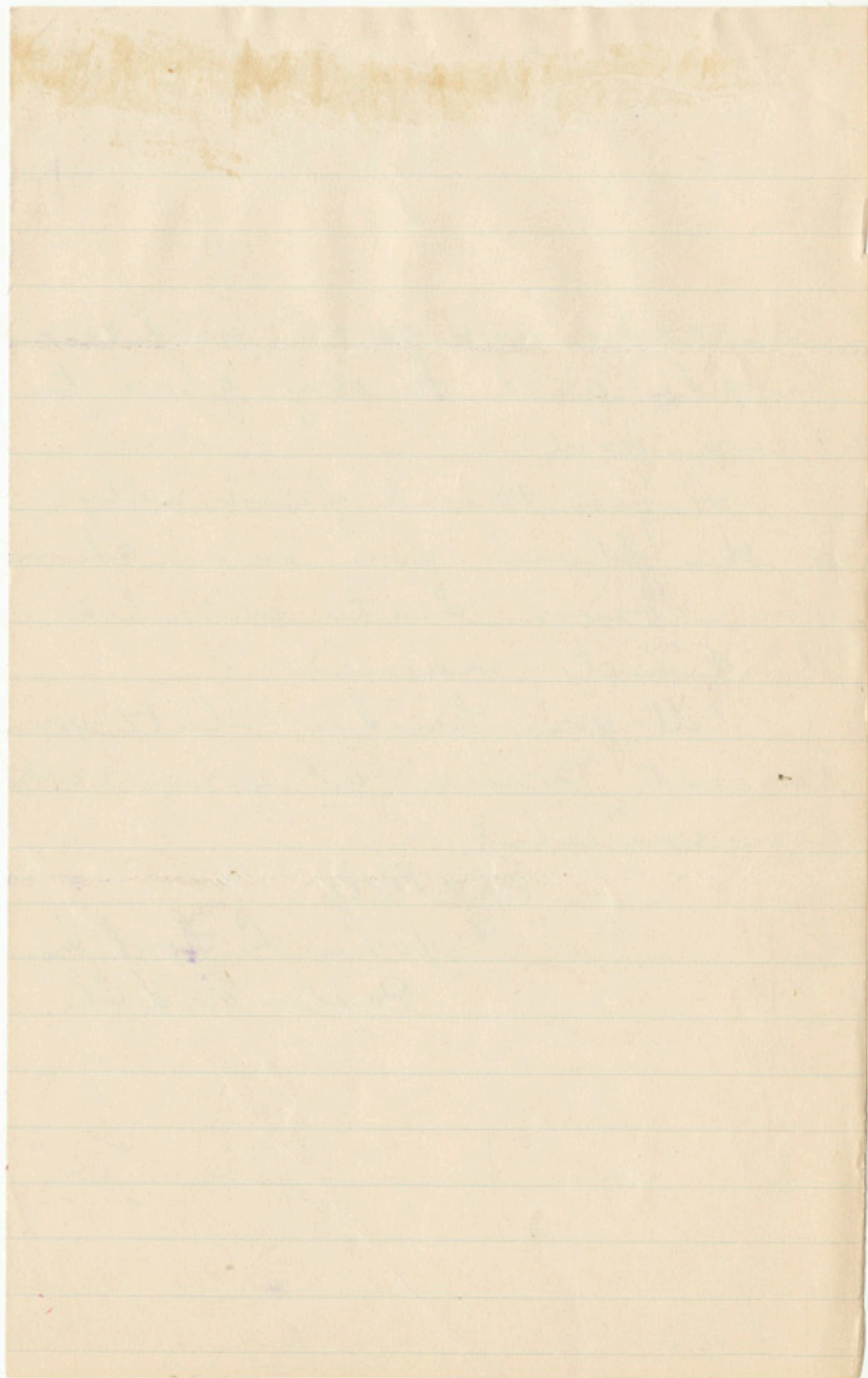

But you are soon to appear upon the rostrum throughout the country and I shall most probably slip into some of your audiences before the tour shall be ended. If it be determined to include this city in your appointments please consider that you are most cordially invited by Mrs. Whipple and myself to make headquarters at our house while

Sajourning - of course you will come with us.

And you intend to make your home in Burlington, Vermont! This delights me. I first saw the light in the village of Williston, eight miles east of Burlington, and have never lost my love for and pride in that ^{portion} ~~portion~~ ^{of our} beloved land. Salutation to the manly men and womanly women of the Green Mountain State! The people of B. will feel honored by your coming to live among them and will miss no occasion to manifest their appreciation, by acts of kindness and courtesy that go far to make living agreeable in any community. The fact that Captain Sey is stationed there will be no small factor in the sum of advantages in a home by Champlain, the beautiful. Several times I have seen complimentary notices of the Captain in connection with the construction of Fort Ethan Allen (how appropriate the name) and no doubt he deserves every word of the praise given him. Consciousness and the approval of superiors in authority are about the only rewards an army officer can expect for the performance of duty.

A merry little boy in your party to Alaska 20 years ago I remember very well; and how stoutly he made the ascent of the glacier with the rest of us, proudly shouting, "Excellior is my motto!"

I hope his gaze will ~~be~~ continue to be upward long after he shall have passed through the junior grades of his regiment.

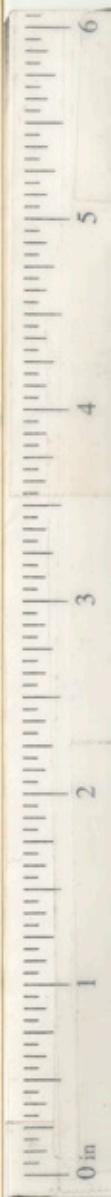

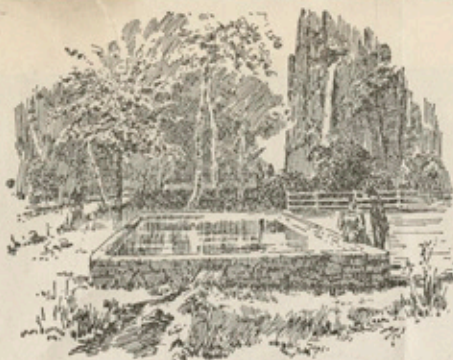

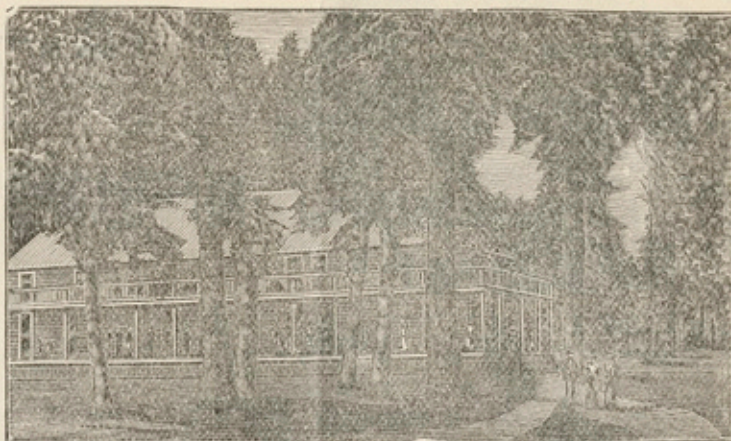

Old Bingham Springs Hotel—Built in 1862.



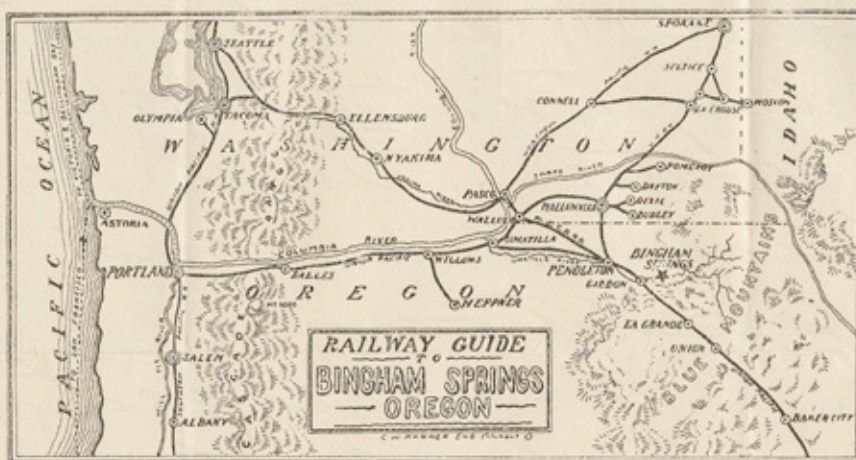
