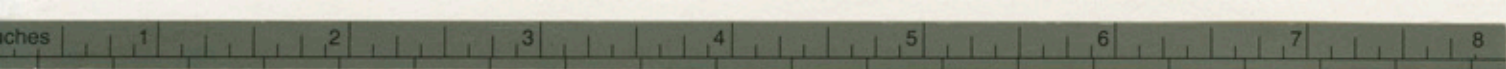
I beg to state, that Mr. D. L. Moody's

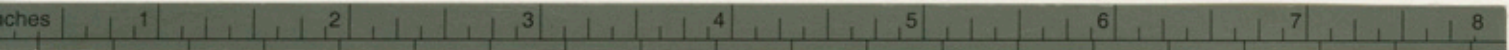

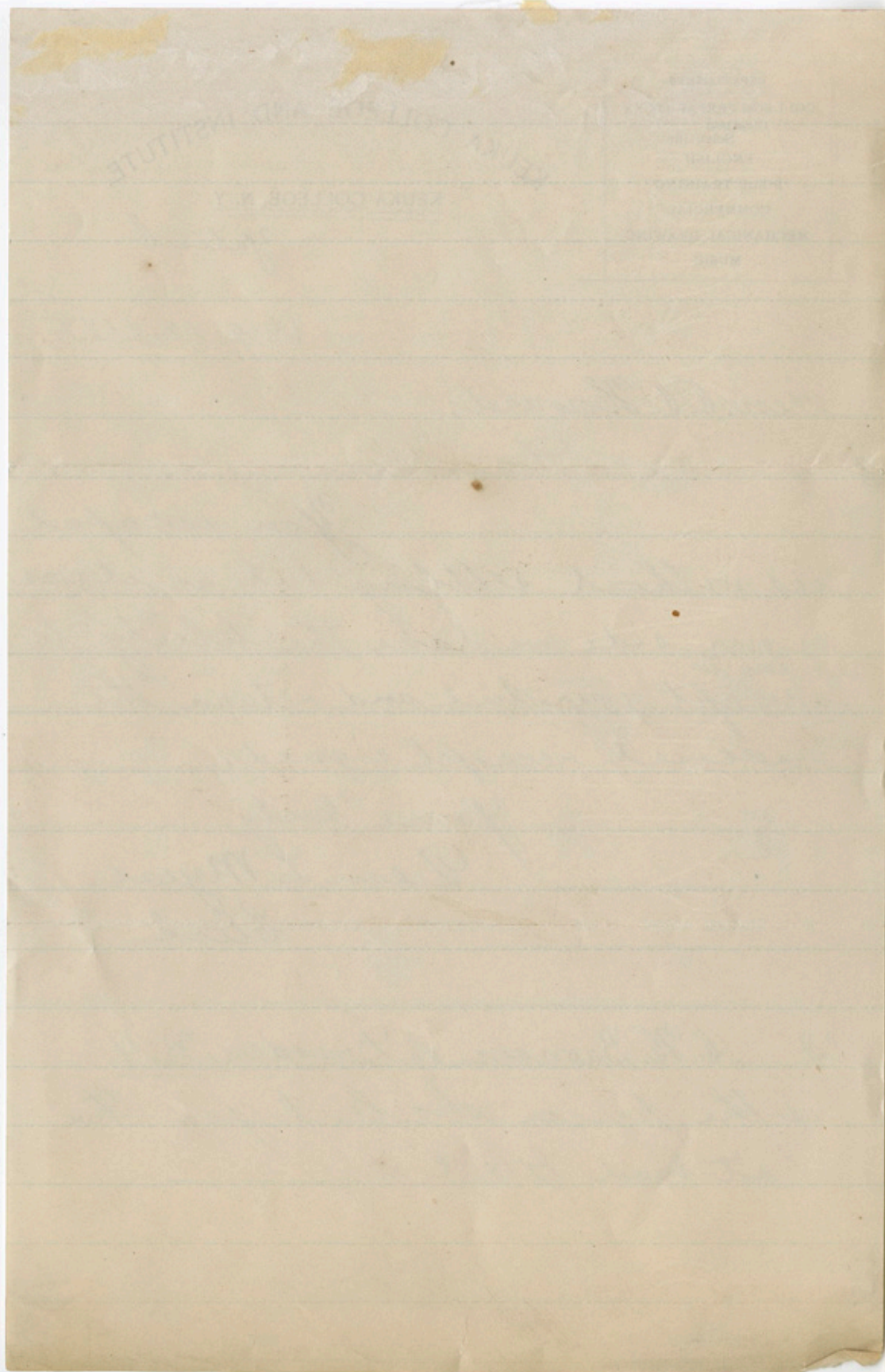

My dear General:-

The papers have it that you were in the City last Tuesday. That was the day of our Camp Memorial Excursion, and I am very sorry that I did not know of your intended visit here, for two reasons-

First, I wanted to have a talk with you about Camp Memorial work very much. Some matters need careful, prayerful and active attention; not that anything is going wrong, but we are just now approaching the time when we must arrange for our Autumn Campaign, and while I have my plans mostly arranged or in form for a grand forward movement in our Spiritual & Rescue work, our Institutional work is not arranged for. I am perplexed about the Kindergarten especially. I wrote you

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about that, about two weeks ago, And then there are other matters which have been thrown upon us through the failure of the Insurance Company in which the building was insured, of which, no doubt Mr. Meyerholz, as Secretary of the Board of Trustees will write to you, as well as one or two other things that demand immediate attention.

I write you, I think that my commission as Pastor of Camp Memorial expires on the 15th inst., and in view of that fact we had a special meeting of the Congregation yesterday, a number of our most active members were absent, such as the Franciscos + Mrs. Wilson who are off on their vacation. However, there was quite a good meeting + the unanimous + most enthusiastic action of the Congregation was to make application to the Home Missionary Society for half the salary, but fixing the amount of the salary at \$1200, + asking therefore of the Home Missionary Soc. \$600.00.

Mr. Meyerholz will forward to you the application to the Society for your endorsement as Chairman of the Board of Trustees.

My second reason for wanting to see you on Tuesday was that you might see us as we turned ourselves loose on the old Iron pier & along the beach & in the surf at Coney Island - In other words, to enjoy with us our annual outing. You know that for a number of years past, we enjoyed this day with you - and no doubt many will remember your presence and helpfulness in many ways on these occasions in years to come.

We missed you very much. Mr. Camp made the acquaintance of Mr. P. Lorillard on the boat and interested him much in our work. I hope we may be able to enlist him as a patron.

Another reason why I wished to see you was concerning a matter I intimated I felt compelled to do in my last letter to you, and which I failed to accomplish so far, and of which I would not say a word but for your warm hearted offer on your last visit to me when in the City last. I refer to the suggested loan. I trust that you are not suffering from

The intense heat we have been sweltering in during the last ten days, and while you are not blessed with the ocean breezes, that you have the pure mountain atmosphere and water from living springs and that up in the Green Mountains, while working no less actively than while here, you are doing so with less to draw your attention away from that you have in hand.

I pray the Lord that He may abundantly bless you in your work & keep you strong & vigorous for many years to come.

At our Congregational meeting yesterday it was also suggested and practically decided that at our annual meeting in October, that a permanent call be extended to me. It is hoped that we shall have quite a large gathering at the annual meeting and that all the members of the Church and the Congregation and that also as many of the patrons as possible be present on that occasion, which will be on Tuesday October 8th. A pleasant feature to me of yesterday's service was, when I came in to the Church last night to service, was to find a large floral

Loveshoe upon the pulpit, placed there by our members as a birthday remembrance. I need not say it touched me very much.

I have all two things that are upon my mind that I am very anxious to bring about this Fall, in addition to the general work, one of which is, to help out in the general work, & is almost absolutely necessary for it, and that is the appointment of Miss Kraul as Missionary Convoasser for the Sunday School. You know we have been trying to get a patroness for this work, but so far have not been able to secure one. The other is, as I think I intimated to you when here, to send Willie Hauptmann to come school to study for the ministry. I think you will endorse me when I say that he is called to that work from his consecrated spirit, love for the work and natural endowments. He has been trying to pick up some Greek during the summer months, with me. Of course it has not amounted to a great deal. But his mind now

is set

To make the very best of himself for the work of the Lord and to make the best of his endowments and opportunities along that line. I think Oberlin College offers the very best facilities for his necessities, as he has nothing more than a common school education, but is ambitious to learn and will make all necessary sacrifices and work hard. Let me know what you think of it and Oberlin.

Please excuse this long letter, but I have not begun to say what I have to tell you. You know I consider this work very dear to your heart, and whatever is being done and the outlook is always interesting to you.
