I told him that we have already bought it. He then stated that he was a guest at the Four Seasons Hotel for a time and was present at its opening. When I told him our purchase price, he said that it was practically no price at all. He then stated that Mrs. McCormick is going to put her money in the Southern education. The McCormicks have a home at Lake Forest and the Lake Forest University is a Presbyterian institution. Mr. Durand knows you and your brother, so he told me. I hope that we may get this matter before Mrs.




