Dear General Howard:

Yours of yesterday is this morning received.

Upon thinking over the situation, I telegraphed to Major McKinley as

follows:- "If any Cabinet officer is to be selected from this State,
I beg to add my testimony to that already offered that the
selection of General Horace Porter would contribute most
largely to the public welfare and would give most general
satisfaction."

The Republican State Machine here has lately sent a representative to Canton to demand from Major McKinley formal recognition of the Machine as such. Yesterday, it is supposed, a delegation of prominent New Yorkers left here to make an antagonistic request in behalf of General Porter. It may be that the effect of this will be to deprive this State of representation in the Cabinet, and it is not necessary to assume that you have no prospect of appointment; though my own feeling of late has been that the political forces back of each of the prominent candidates for position in the Cabinet had become so great and fierce that the President-elect in self-defence would have to select from among those most strongly backed.
