

If it is not too late, I take the liberty to suggest that you take pains to contract with the Bureau in such a way as to limit the number of lectures per week and to limit the distances to be traveled. I know of some people who have been utterly worn out by an excess of engagements coupled with long distances to be traveled.

I shall be glad if you can find it convenient to reserve next Feb.12 for me. I have in mind an entertainment for that date for Lincoln Memorial University, to be given in Chicago or Louisville with you and Col. Watterson and a few others in the programme. My idea would be to make it a business matter, paying you in behalf of the University what I paid you last year. Such a celebration

of Lincoln's birthday will be helpful to the University.

A few days ago I again saw Col. Huntington Jackson, merely dropping in for a short chat with him. I was surprised to hear him say that the condition of the people in East Tennessee in no way appeals to him. He says that the State of Tennessee ought to educate its own people. He says also that the people of the mountain country went into that country and made their nests there and should be willing to stand by the result. He said that all that appeals to him in a charitable way is the people of Chicago ad and those of the new North West. He says that he has a very warm feeling toward the needy people in the Dakotas and Minnesota. I did not tell him that these people went there and made their nests with their eyes open. Some time ago I met another man who said that East Tennessee could educate its own people, that he had no money to send away from home for such a purpose; that he did not believe in helping people away from home anyway; and that he thought that after a while he should give some money to Yale University. East Tennessee is 500 miles from Chicago, while Yale is 1000 miles away.

In contrast with these cases, I called to see Mr.McCprmick last Saturday and found that he had just gone out of town for a week. His secretary discussed the entire case with me very fully and surprised me by saying that Mr.McCormick had lately been talking with him about us and that he thought Mr.McCormick would want an interview on his return. I shall see what comes of this and let you know.



I hope I shall be more successful when you come here for the Grant Monument Parade, in which I am glad to see that you are to take a leading part. I would have seen you in Washington at the head of your column of veterans if I had remained for the Inauguration, but I deemed it prudent to return home and thus avoid the crowd and too much excitement. I have a letter from your son acquainting me with the desire of your friends to see you appointed Minister to Turkey. It seems to me you are just the man for that position and I shall say so to the President when I have an opportunity. I am sorry I had not heard the suggestion while I was in Washington. I have no reason to suppose that I have any influence with the President, or that my wishes in your behalf would make any impression on him or on the Secretary of State.
