Some time ago I wrote asking you if you would give me as strong an endorsement as you could & also see me with the President - urging my appointment as one of the Commissioners to the Paris Exposition in 1889 - At about the same time many of my friends urged me to apply for the position of Asst-Secty of War - As it had been published that an old soldier would probably get it - I telegraphed you for your assistance - & received your answer - & in a few days another man was appointed - Not having heard from you in regard to the first - and thinking you may have thought I had abandoned it - I write to say it is - & has been my greatest desire to obtain it. The two Expositions in Europe which I assisted in organizing - the last one of 76 - installing, & I think securing the credit of being its greatest promoter - and Executive officer - you know about my loyal adherence to my Republican principles; my fights & victories - aside from war records you are familiar with - Of course I was a strong McKinley man - but having decided

my home in Washington I have not ~~applied~~^{yet}
for any of the Georgia patronage - tho' I can
I have the support of every party man
in the State, & the endorsement of any business
man in Atlanta as to my ability and
educative qualifications - I feel that
a strong endorsement from you, both
in a letter which I can add to - show
I now have - & a personal appeal to the
President - will be my greatest help. Senator
Proctor has expressed an interest, & all
the assistance in his power. At first it
seemed a thing that could wait until
later - but the President has made an
appeal to Congress to present a bill and
make an appropriation - & I am hearing
of others who are applying - I hesitate to
ask this as I have so frequently asked
for your endorsement. But - hearing always
from the true friend I again ask
you to do what you can - Your kind regards
