Dear General: -

The proposition to arrange a co-operation between Lincoln Memorial University and the O.R.C. will be brought up at the meeting of the Grand Division at Los Angeles week after next. I have talked with a number of conductors and other railroad men and they all speakfavorably of the plan. We will propose to -give the Order a free lease of land for their cottages for their orphans and dependent members; to give the orphans in those cottages free tuition in the Kindergarten, the Elementary School and the Academy; and to give free medical treatment to the orphans and members located in these cottages.

In exchange, all the members of the Order (there are something over 25,000) shall contribute \$1.00 as often as we procure \$75,000 from other sources until this has been done ten times. This will bring \$250,000 from the Order.

Some of the conductors are enthusiastic on the subject and say they will give the matter all the support they can. I shall write out the whole matter carefully and concisely and wish to accompany the proposition with supplemental matter regarding the mountain country, its scenery and climate, and the character of the property which we have and the desirability of making such
