



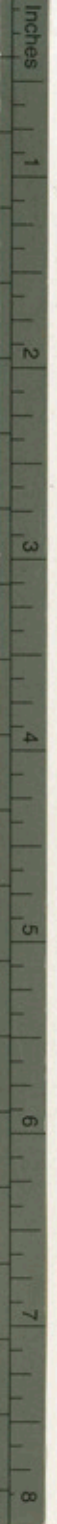
Dear Gen.:
