Our Life Members stand in a specially close relation to the work of this Society. They have it in their power at any regular or special meeting to modify and to fix its policy, and by that means greatly to affect the scope and extent of its work. While the fact of life membership lays no moneyed obligation upon any one standing in that relation to us, we are sure that there are many among our Life Members who would be glad to know the exact condition of the work at the present time and to render it some special ald.

After disbursing the carefully estimated value of the Stickney securities, we have thirty-four applications calling for $\$ 210,000$. left over, which it is impossible for us at present to consider. A few of those calling for smaller sums seem to us very clearly to be emergency cases that ought to be considered and helped, out of our current receipts. But those receipts are nowhere near equal to the demand. There are thirty of these applications of the ordinary kind asking for sums varying from \$200. to $\$ 3,000$, in all asking for $\$ 23,150$. It has seemed to us more than possible that many of our Life Members would like to send a generous sum, any sum in fact, to relieve this pressure, so that churches struggling to build can be housed before winter sets in.
