Dear Sir: -

We inclose copies of recent letters received from Mr. Deacon relative to the lands mortgaged to Gen. O. O. Howard.

There is no change in the ownership of these lands, nor is there any change in the taxes due on the mortgage since our last statement. There is no demand for country property, especially as this whole State is suffering for the want of rain. There is every indication that a storm is brewing at the present time, but the same conditions have disappointed us frequently in the last four months.

We would advise you not to begin foreclosure suit until the parties interested are heard from definitely on the two propositions now before them - 1st, you to release part of the land on payment of \$2,000, etc. 2nd, they to deed the property back to General Howard, free of all incumbrances, etc.

We expect to hear from Mr. Deacon in a few days, and will report the result of our negotiations at the earliest moment possible.
