Sec. of the Navy, the Head of the Naval Militia and the Executive, and met with unanimous and hearty approval, and it was the hope of these officials that the plan therein contained would be carried into effect at the earliest possible date, as a spontaneous declaration of loyalty on the part of the people at this time would not only be a wise military measure but a valuable peace argument. 


