My Dear General:-

When in Chicago a few days ago I had a conversation with Mr. Morton Culver concerning his physical ability to continue to the end the important suit in connection with the Keene Bank Estate, in which we are both so deeply interested. Mr. Culver is better than he was some time ago, but we have against us one of the most powerful law firms in the City of Chicago, and the fact that they are fighting us on mere technicalities indicates their shrewdness and determination to prevent the case coming up on its merits.
